Bullets pepper Dover Street home

Bullets flew through a Dover Street home as a vehicle drove past around 4:15 Saturday morning, residents told Shelbyville police. No one was injured.

One of the residents said she was awakened by the sound of gunshots followed by bullets entering the house. She said she got out of bed, took cover and called 911.

A police officer found one of the bullets in a bedroom among blankets; another was recovered from a bedroom closet. A neighbor reported hearing five gunshots.

Suspect arrested

A second suspect has been charged in connection with armed robberies of T & M Market, Depot Street, and two people outside a Germantown Road home.

Traynesha Garrett, 21, of Landers Street is charged with criminal responsibility for aggravated robbery, Detective Lt. Charles Merlo of the Shelbyville Police Department said.

Garrett allegedly helped Godice Clark, who is charged with aggravated robbery, and a second suspect who has not been found, escape after both robberies, Merlo said. She is being held on \$20,000

Realistic BB gun

A teenage boy displayed a BB gun resembling a serious firearm to an employee of AutoZone, North Main Street, during an argument Thursday night.

The boy, who has been charged with aggravated assault in juvenile court, told Shelbyville police he was upset because an employee refused to test his vehicle's battery. The employee said he told the boy to leave and a shoving match erupted, with the boy telling him he was lucky he was wearing an "employee

shirt." The employee allegedly removed his shirt; the boy said the employee pushed him against a wall. The employee denied any further contact.

The boy admitted going to his vehicle and returning with what is described by Officer Bailey Dineen as a "Glock-style CO2 BB gun," cocking it before speeding away. A co-worker told police the threatened employee was screaming "Pull the trigger!" Others in the store said the boy never actually pointed the gun toward anyone.

Police charged the boy, released him to a parent and confiscated the BB gun.

She was held on \$36,000 bond.

FALL WEBWORMS I've seen some trees that

are full of nasty looking webs that the webworms have built with leaves and spun webs. And these trees look bad. With these webworms

there's bad news and good news. The bad news is that they make a mess, and these webs prevent treating with sprays because they cannot penetrate to reach the webworms. The good news is that these trees are mature and they can withstand this invasion. They have been healthy all season and these leaves are about to change color and drop off anyway.

I've added a picture of one of these trees. And this particular tree has these things practically every fall. It's a walnut and it has a crop of nuts on it. It just looks bad.

The trees to be concerned about are the young trees with tent caterpillars in webs at the trunk and limb junctions. These larvae will strip the leaves off of the young trees early in the spring and this can damage the young trees. Watch for these in the spring.





Tide's offseason transfer pickups, receiver Jameson Williams and linebacker Henry To'oTo'o, have already given Alabama fans a glimpse of what they hope to expect through the season. The Ohio State transfer

Silicon Valley finds remote work is easier to begin than end

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Technology companies that led the charge into remote work as the pandemic unfurled are confronting a new challenge: how, when and even whether they should bring long-

back to offices that

have been designed

for teamwork. "I thought this period of remote work would be the most challenging vear-and-half of my career, but it's not. said Brent Hyder, the chief people officer for business software maker Salesforce and its roughly 65,000 employees worldwide. "Getting everything started back up the way it needs to be

is proving to be even

more difficult.'

That transition has been complicated by the rapid spread of the delta variant, which has scrambled the plans many tech companies had for bringing back most of their workers near or after Labor Day weekend. Microsoft has pushed those dates back to October while Apple, Google, Facebook, Amazon and a growing list of others have already

decided wait until next year. Given how they set the tone for remote work, tech companies' returnto-office policies will likely have ripple effects across other industries. Employers' next steps could redefine how and where people work, predicts Laura Boudreau, a Columbia University

workplace issues. "We have moved beyond the theme of remote work being a temporary thing, Boudreau says. The longer the pandemic has stretched on, she says, the harder it's become to tell employees to come

back to the office,

Because they typically revolve around digital and online products, most tech jobs are tailor made for remote work. Yet most major tech companies insist that their employees should be ready to work in the office two or three days each week after the pandemic is over.

The main reason: Tech companies have long believed that employees clustered together in a physical space will swap ideas and spawn innovations that probably wouldn't have happened in isolation. That's one reason tech titans have poured billions of dollars into corporate campuses interspersed with alluring common areas meant to lure employees out of their cubicles and into "casual collisions" that turn into brainstorming sessions. But the concept of
