County sharing \$2.1 million land deal

Potential 33 acres for industry

Bedford County Board of Commissioners voted unanimous approval last Tuesday of the county paying its share of a \$2.1 million land purchase for expansion of 231 North Industrial Park.

The land comprises approximately 33 acres at 2905 U.S. 231 North adjacent to the park. Current owner Janice Carlton will receive \$2.1 million, with the city and county splitting the cost evenly. The land will be annexed into the Shelbyville City limits.

Proponents say the additional land is needed because of demand by potential industrial pros-

pects for direct access to the highway. A new campus for Tennessee College of Applied Technology-Shelbyville (TCAT) will also be part of the park.

The park's current entrance is on narrow Frank Martin Road.

Before the land vote, Bedford County Commission moved last Tuesday in favor of a new interlocal agreement with the City of Shelbyville for operation and development of 231 North Business Park, replacing a previous agreement ratified in 2015.

The resolution specifies that the park's oversight committee has the authority and responsibility to "enter into contracts or

execute any instruments" on behalf of the city and county and "define the terms of purchase of any land or property that may become part of, an addition to, or an extension of, 231 North Commissioner Park.

Commissioner Greg Vick told fellow commissioners any financial actions involving the county would require advance approval by the full commission following advancement through the committee process.

Commissioner Bill Anderson made a motion that one portion of the revised interlocal agreement - stating "The Oversight Committee has authority to use proceeds

Bypass honors legacy of Eugene Ray

Family, friends and associates of the late Bedford County Mayor Eugene Ray gathered on Saturday, Sept. 18, at Bedford County Justice Complex to celebrate the naming of State Route 437 as the Mayor Eugene Ray Memorial Highway.

The ceremony was to have been held on the bypass, but had to be moved indoors due to weather conditions. Several speakers noted the appropriateness of the venue; it was Ray who often had to keep the justice complex project moving forward, warning county commissioners of the consequences if the State of Tennessee decertified the county jail.

The facility finally opened in December 2019, a few months after Ray's passing.

Those attending the ceremony were able to watch a live stream as a sign was unveiled at the bypass's northwestern end by a sheriff's deputy.

Ray, who won state acclaim for strengthening the county's financial management and worked to bring the county more options for higher education, died Aug. 7, 2019, at age 82.

Ray left office at the end of August 2018 after 12 years as Bedford County's first African-American county mayor and 28 years before that as a county commissioner. He chaired the county commission for years as a commissioner and continued to chair it as mayor.

Speakers at the dedication ceremony praised Ray as a servant leader, a man of faith and compassion.

One of Ray's daughters, Dr. Kertrina Brame, quoted Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me," in reference to her father.

Granddaughter Mary Avent noted that Ray took great pride in Shelbyville and Bedford County and would talk about them to everyone he encountered while traveling.

Grandson Charles Avent Jr. said that it was appropriate that a bypass be named for him. "He was never afraid to bypass and get things done," said Avent.

Bedford County Clerk and Master Curt Cobb, a close associate of Ray's, listed all of the projects accomplished or begun during Ray's time in office, including Middle Tennessee Education Center; new buildings for Community High School and Cascade High School; an

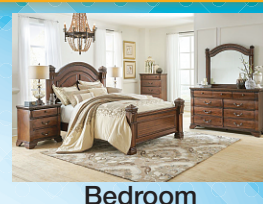
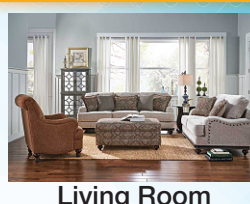

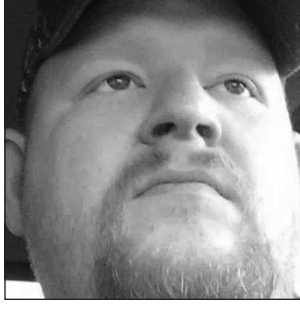

of the sale of Park property for the acquisition of additional lands adjacent to or near the park for inclusion in the Park as approved through their annual budget process" – be removed and the remainder of the agreement approved. Anderson has consistently said that decisions involving "taxpayers' money" should be made by Shelbyville City Council and Bedford County Commission, not the oversight committee. That motion failed 9-8; 10 votes were needed to pass.

The commission voted 15-1 to approve the revised agreement with Anderson dissenting.

A change in the makeup of the park's oversight committee is included in the new agreement. The previous committee included a member of Shelbyville-Bedford County Chamber of Commerce. That position will now be filled by the Director of Economic Development for Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership Inc. Shane Hooper currently holds that position.

Hooper, as director of economic development

for Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership Inc., will be the point person for handling contracts. The committee is made up of one Bedford County Commissioner, one Shelbyville City Council member, and one representative each from the City and County governments in addition to Hooper.

Commissioner Linda Yockey said she disagrees with the committee rather than County Financial Director Robert Daniel approving contracts. She requested that a decision on the interlocal agreement be deferred until October's commission meeting so details could be studied further.

That request drew a strong response from Commissioner Jeff Sweeney, who said industrial development moves at a quick pace and that the Commission has a history of repeatedly delaying decisions. Sweeney said industrial prospects need and expect fast responses.

"This is a perfect example of what's going on with economic development right now," Sweeney said. "We have companies coming in that are talking to Shane, they're very interested in our industrial park, and they have a window to make decisions based on

all-new school, Learning Way Elementary; the jail and judicial complex; the 231 North Business Park; and Bedford County Courthouse Annex.

Cobb also noted the creation of county finance and information technology department's under Ray's administration.

State Sen. Shane Reeves quoted his father, former Murfreesboro Mayor Richard Reeves: "There is not a finer man than Eugene Ray," Richard Reeves told his son.

"I miss him every day," said State Rep. Pat Marsh, who would introduce him as "the best mayor in all of Tennessee."

Tennessee General

Assembly must approve memorial names on state highways. Reeves and Marsh requested that Ray be honored after receiving a resolution of support from Bedford County Board of Commissioners.

Charles Avent thanked the General Assembly, county commissioners, various local agencies, and the committee which put together Saturday's event.

Anthony Booker, minister of Bird Street Church of Christ, gave the invocation for the event.

Before his election as county mayor, Ray had worked at the U.S. Air Force Arnold Engineering Development Complex and as a real estate agent.

location, finance, opportunity, other counties pursuing their business, and when they come into a meeting discussing business with Shane it's critical that we fail to give them an answer within 30 to 45 days...At some point we have to trust the system. It's frustrating...I know for a fact we've lost a couple of deals because we could not give them an answer."

Sweeney thinks the current industrial boom taking place across middle Tennessee will eventually reduce in number and the county needs to take advantage of current opportunities quickly.

"We're going to lose those opportunities, if we sit here every 30 days arguing about it," Commissioner Mark Thomas added.

Rezoning

Rezoning of 130 acres of land north and west of the U.S. 231 North-Eady Road intersection from A-1 (Agricultural-Forestry) to C-1 (Commercial Rural Center District) was unanimously approved by the commission.

"We have periodic inquiries regarding this property on Highway 231 North, and all of them are commercial in nature," an application

filed by a representative of owner DHRK Properties LLC said.

Businesses ranging from a concrete plant to a park containing businesses connected with the restoration and repair of extremely high-end high-performance vehicles such as Ferraris and Lamborghinis have been mentioned as possible uses for the property in previous zoning-related meetings.

Smith resignation

Questions were raised about why former commissioner Brent Smith, who resigned his District 1 seat after moving to the Wartrace area from his former home near Bell Buckle, wasn't participating in the meeting.

Former Commissioner Chasity Gunn announced her resignation in July but participated in the August meetings of the full commission and a subcommittee. The commission was told that Gunn had not yet moved to her new home outside her Shelbyville district at the time of those meetings.

Smith announced his resignation after his move.

Smith was praised and recognized for his work by fellow Commissioners.

HAIRSPRAY STUCK ON CURLING IRON?

Dear Readers: If you use a curling iron, it's likely that hairspray will accumulate on it. Here's how to remove that sticky spray. First, after using the curling iron, unplug it and allow it to cool. Then use one of these two ways to get the spray off:

1. Pour a couple of drops of rubbing alcohol on an old washcloth or terry-cloth towel. Wipe over the surface of the iron. Then clean off with a water-dampened cloth.
 2. Make a paste of equal parts baking soda and water. Rub this mixture over the surface and wipe off with a slightly wet cloth.
- Baking soda is so useful around your home, and it saves you

money. - DO choose the right boat. There are boats rated for kayak racing and those that are strictly for recreational purposes. Some boats are meant for calmer waters and others for waves and open seas.
- DON'T forget to check the weather forecast before heading out in the water.

Storms can come up relatively quickly, and offshore winds can make it challenging to paddle back to shore.

- DO let someone know where you're going and how long you plan to be out on the water.
- DON'T touch or get too close to wildlife, as animals can be unpredictable and even dangerous.
- DO dress for the water temperature and not the weather outside. This helps ensure your health if you intentionally or accidentally enter the water.
- DON'T skip wearing a

life jacket/buoyancy aid.

- DO expect to get wet, even if you do not fall in. Splash up will occur from paddles and some water will get in the boat regardless.
- DON'T forget to bring along some snacks and water.
- DO bring a fellow kayaker along. Whether you're a novice or a seasoned professional, bringing a friend along ensures someone can go for help if you're involved in an accident or suffer an injury.

Heavy rains soak Bedford County

Water was seemingly everywhere Monday as three waves of heavy rain soaked Bedford County.

Flooding was occurring Monday in Shelbyville, with all eyes on Duck River at Fisherman's Park and the possibility the city floodgate would be raised.

The National Weather Service had forecast Duck River to peak at 29.5 feet, well above the 25-foot flood stage, Monday night. But that forecast was issued before additional rains moved into the area Monday morning.

At 29 feet, water reaches the access road at St. William of Montevergine

Catholic Church on South Brittain Street, property near Tyson Foods on West Jackson Street and buildings along the east side of South Cannon Boulevard.

West Jackson Street was closed due to high water Monday morning.

The first wave of storms took its main toll in a valley on Carr Creek Road at mid-afternoon Saturday. A flash flood led to a torrent pouring down one particular area, washing away property and vehicles at a home at 555 Carr Creek Road. Cars were stranded in high water on Carr Creek Road and nearby Rowesville Road. No injuries were reported.

Continuous heavy rain county-wide Sunday, added to Saturday's storms, led to Duck River reaching flood stage. The river also rose due to water being released at Normandy Dam, according to the Tennessee Valley Authority. Low-lying areas of College Street and Front Street in Normandy were flooded, as well as Dement Bridge north of Normandy and the Three Forks Bridge area near Wartrace.

Street flooding was occurring at mid-morning Monday in Shelbyville due to an hour-long heavy rain that tapered off before noon.

FARMERS MARKET

The market will continue to be open on into October. The late planted summer crops are still in good supply. The fall vegetables are coming in and available.

Come to the market at the Pavilion next to the big blue water tower at the Celebration Grounds. The market is on Thursday afternoons at 2:30 pm.

AG ENHANCEMENT

We're coming up on the application period of October 1-7. We have the application packets at the office. I urge anyone with interest in the program from the Tennessee Department of Agriculture to come by and pick one up.

There are project cost-share sections for livestock, row crop, poultry and diversified farming enterprises. Each one has operation requirements and project limits and that information is in the packets. Come by the Extension office at 2105 Midland Road and look this cost-share program over to see if it will help your operation.

There certain eligibility certifications that are required, and I can do those trainings here at the office by appointment. But with a short time left, it is important to look at the requirements now to determine what is needed now.

born calves has started. Local markets have had an increase in numbers of calves. This run has caused some depression in calf prices. The Tennessee market Highlights reported steers down \$2-\$6 per cwt. and heifers down \$2-\$7.

Cow culling has started in the western states in response to dry conditions and limited feed supplies and our own culling season has begun. With an increase in cow numbers for harvest, the market for such cows dropped \$2-\$4 cwt.

Corn was up 10 cents on the December futures and closed at \$5.37/bu. Tennessee is projected to make a record crop, but other parts of the country will be well below their average yields due to the weather of extreme dry weather or wet, depending on location.

Soybeans were down, with lower exports reported for the past few weeks. November soybean futures closed down 2 cents at \$12.84. While that is not a huge drop, it is still less money. When you put 2 cents on several thousand bushels, it a lot of money. Most of our farmers have presold a good bit of their crop at a price predetermined, but those soybeans not sold are still at risk.

Cascade wins fifth-straight game

LYNNVILLE — The Cascade Champions haven't had a 5-0 start since the 2008 season, until now. Cascade (5-0, 2-0) won its fifth-straight game to start the 2021 season on Friday night, scoring the game-winning touchdown late in the fourth quarter to stun the Richland Raiders, 21-14. Cascade never led until it mattered most, when Elijah Arnold bulldozed his way through the Raider defensive line with one second left to score the game-winning touchdown. "We're the cardiac kids. We like to make it interesting. They did what they're supposed to do. They stayed in the game the whole time with the delay and all the injuries we had, we played the game until the final whistle and you can't ask for more than that," Champion coach Jake Tyre said. Cascade entered Friday night's Region 5-AA matchup riding an

unbeaten streak to start the 2021 campaign and not only had to battle a hostile road environment, but the elements as well. Following a scoreless first quarter, the game was halted because of a lightning delay with 11:44 left in the first half. After an approximate 30-minute delay, Cascade forced a quick Richland punt and took possession on its own 21-yard line. With a steady mix of pass and run plays, Cascade appeared to have a big gain on a pass from senior quarterback Ryan Inmon to Hayden Dowell set up the Champs into Richland territory. But on the same play, while Cascade pushed the pile to pick up more yardage, Richland (1-4, 0-2) stripped the ball and took over possession on the 46-yard line with 8:15 left in the half. The Raiders chewed up nearly eight minutes of game clock on

the following drive that finished with a one-yard touchdown by Sam Edwards at the 1:25 mark in the second quarter. Things nearly took a disastrous turn for Cascade after the Champions fumbled the ensuing kickoff on their own 20-yard line. With a dwindling clock, the Cascade defense held strong and forced Richland to attempt a 28-yard field goal, which missed wide right just before the half. After forcing a punt on the first drive of the third quarter, Cascade finally mobilized its offense on a scoring drive that spanned just over three minutes that churned out 58 yards of offense before Ryan Inmon broke loose on a 39-yard score with 6:03 left on the clock. Drake Hodge connected on his first of three successful kicks to tie the game at seven apiece.

After Inmon's score, Richland orchestrated another lengthy drive that chewed up nearly six minutes off the clock. The Raiders were able to keep the chains moving on the drive, twice converting on third down and once on fourth down before retaking the lead on a seven-yard run by Edwards as zeroes hit the clock. As the quickly as the momentum shifted in the Raiders' favor following Edwards' second score of the night, Cascade snatched it right back, barely 15 seconds later. On the ensuing kickoff, which opened the fourth quarter, Xamarion Dixon took the return inside the Cascade 10-yard line, found his blockers along the right sideline and returned the kickoff 95 yards to once again knot the score after Hodge's second kick of the night.

"We were setting up all week for a wall on that side. He (Dixon) got it and went with it," Tyre said. The two teams continued to play the field position game until Cascade punted with under five minutes left in regulation, setting up the Raiders with first down from their own 20-yard line. Three plays later, Champion sophomore Dylan Crouch came through with perhaps the biggest defensive play of the night—a tackle on a Raider pass reception that netted zero yards, prompting a Richland punt with 3:01 left on the clock. Taking over possession on the Richland 41-yard line, and a full supply of timeouts left in the arsenal, Inmon methodically moved Cascade into the red zone, gaining 36 yards on five carries before
