## Coleman found guilty of Circle K armed robbery

At the conclusion of a three-day trial, a 12-person jury found 54-year-old Leslie Lamont Coleman guilty of aggravated robbery Wednesday in the Jan. 15, 2019 armed robbery of a Circle K convenience store in Shelbyville.

Coleman and his accomplice, Deontre Cortez Farris, 21, used knives to threaten the store employee. They were arrested Jan. 16, one day after they committed the crime. The entire incident was captured on surveillance cameras in the store.

Aggravated robbery is when a deadly weapon is used or if the victim suffers serious injury. It is a class B felony punishable by eight to 30 years' imprisonment, as well as a fine of up to \$25,000.

Coleman will be sentenced on Jan. 20.

Farris confessed to the crime and testified against Coleman. His case has not yet been resolved. He was scheduled to appear in court for a review hearing five days after Coleman was found guilty. He could accept a plea deal at the hearing.

It is likely Coleman will be sentenced to a long term in prison as his past criminal history will be considered by Judge Forest Alexander Durard, Jr.

Coleman was sen-

tenced in October 1991 to life in prison in a remarkably similar case.

On Dec. 9, 1990, Coleman (who was 24 years old at the time) and his 17-year-old stepbrother, Kenneth Wayne Robinson, Jr., robbed a Jim Dandy Market on Nolensville Pike in Nashville. In that robbery, Coleman reportedly stole a 12-pack of Budweiser. Coleman and his stepbrother also stole the store clerk's car and later abandoned it and burned it.

Just why Coleman was free from prison at the time of the Shelbyville crime was not determined through investigation of this court case. However, state laws regarding sentencing have changed over the course of those years.

In the Shelbyville robbery of the Circle K, Coleman stole an 18-pack of Bud Light. He and his accomplice also stole cartons of cigarettes (L&M menthols and Newport), various vaping supplies and \$78 that was in the cash register. Coleman is also accused of stealing a

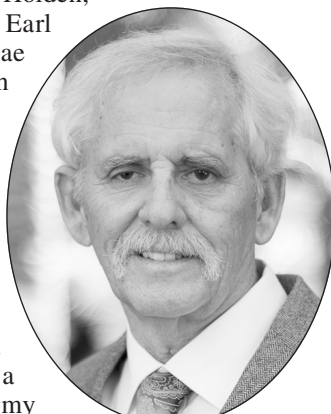

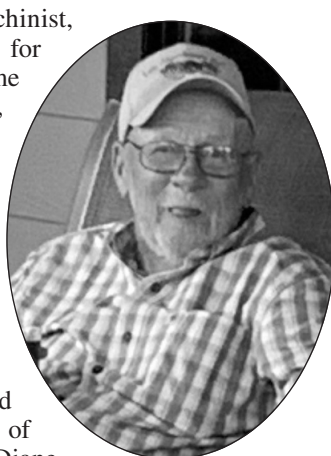

toolbox with tools from the store office.

The biggest difference between the robbery in Nashville three decades earlier and the Shelbyville robbery is in Nashville, Coleman murdered the 35-year-old store clerk, shooting her three times in the back of the head while she lay on the floor in the back room of the store.

Coleman initially blamed the murder on his younger stepbrother but he eventually pled guilty to 1st degree murder and especially aggravated robbery. Coleman's teenage stepbrother, Robinson, was found guilty of kidnapping, robbery and for stealing the store clerk's car but was found not guilty on a murder charge.

**Shelbyville trial details**

Coleman and Farris are accused of robbing the store at around 12:45 a.m. on Jan. 15, 2019. Testimony this week included how the pair forced the store's assistant manager to comply at knifepoint.

Coleman, who has denied involvement in the crime, was allegedly the robber observed on surveillance video who was dressed in a white T-shirt and black cargo pants. The entire incident was captured on seven surveillance cameras in the store.

The store employee had stepped out of the store to take a break and smoke a cigarette and was approached by two men wielding knives. She was ordered back into the store and told to open the safe. She explained to the men that opening the safe would take 10 minutes as it is on a timer. To open the safe first one key is used to start the opening timer and after a 10 minute delay a second key is then used to open it.

While waiting for the safe opening, the two men are seen on video stealing an 18-pack of Bud Lite beer, cartons of cigarettes (L&M menthols and Newport), various vaping supplies and the \$78 that was in the cash register. Coleman is also accused of stealing a toolbox with tools from the store office.

Before the safe delay timer had run its course, a donut delivery truck pulled in and the two men fled the store. The donut delivery driver was later than normal that night. "He came at a good time," the store employee testified. The donut delivery driver recognized that something was wrong. He spotted for-

mer sheriff's deputy Joseph Guthrie, who just happened to be driving by on routine patrol, and alerted him that there was something going on in the Circle K store.

Guthrie saw the two perpetrators standing next to a white Dodge sedan parked in the westbound lane of Wartrace Pike/East Depot Street, just down the hill from the store. When the deputy approached the Dodge and activated his emergency lights the two men jumped into the vehicle and sped away toward downtown Shelbyville.

Guthrie testified Monday that the pursuit reached speeds of "above 80 mph pretty close to 100." Police and dispatch were not initially aware that the incident was an armed robbery so, following department policy, when the vehicle turned onto Coney Island Road, Guthrie was ordered to terminate the high speed pursuit. Guthrie was unable to get the license plate number. There were no suspects immediately but within a couple of hours police had identified Coleman as a suspect.

The assistant store manager testified that she had seen a white Dodge Avenger with two black occupants circle through the lot approximately a half hour before the robbery. She noticed that the vehicle was marked with a black "Avenger" decal.

Approximately an hour after the robbery, around 1:40 a.m., Shelbyville Police Lt. Fred Harvey, "came across" a white Dodge sedan parked at the Magnolia Village apartments on Landers Street. The temperature that January morning was in the 30s. Harvey got out of his patrol vehicle and felt the hood of the Dodge. "It was hot," he said. He radioed in the license number and it came back registered to Coleman.

When interviewed in court Monday, the store assistant manger described her emotions during the robbery. Throughout the incident, on the video, she stood with her hands raised and appeared to be calm and collected, but she said calm was not how she felt. She said she was "praying the whole time. I was terrified." "My number one priority was to get them out of there and keep safe," she said.

Immediately after the robbery, the Circle K employee said, she quit her job at the store where she had worked for 2 and 1/2 years. She testified that she went to counseling, "a lot for awhile." She also testified that in a subsequent job she was unable to work alone at night.

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# Cleaning athletic clothes

After finishing second in the state golf tournament as a freshman, Woosley-Reed followed with three straight state titles and created a prowess as one of the top golfers in the state of any classification.

## Streaking Titans try to stay atop AFC vs. Saints

NASHVILLE — Mike Vrabel dismissed the idea of talking to his Tennessee Titans about playoff seeding and home-field advantage in the playoffs with a succinct response.

No.

His approach stays the same even if the Titans (7-2) have the NFL's longest active winning streak at five to sit atop the AFC halfway through the season. Better yet, the last four victories have come against playoff teams from last season, with each bigger than the last.

"Not going to change anything," Vrabel said.

Tennessee has a chance Sunday against the New Orleans Saints (5-3) to add another 2020 playoff team to its streak. The Titans still are adapting to life without Derrick Henry, who's still the NFL's leading rusher even after a week on injured reserve, and coming off a 28-16 win in Los Angeles over the Rams.

New Orleans is working through replacing quarterback Jameis Winston. Trevor Siemian, who spent time with the Titans last year, had the first crack last week with Taysom Hill getting some spot duty in his return last week in a 27-25 loss to Atlanta that snapped the Saints' own three-game winning streak.

The Saints also come into this game second in the NFC South, trying to stay close to Tampa Bay after their big win over the defending champs.

"We have the Titans this week, and those are the details we are focusing on," Saints linebacker Demario Davis said. "We do not have the luxury of worrying about anything else."

### Streaking

The Titans are 6-0 this season against 2020 playoff teams, beating the Bills, Chiefs, Colts and Rams over the past four weeks. A win Sunday would make the Titans the second team in NFL history to win five straight against playoff teams from the prior season,

something only the 2003 Eagles managed.

The Saints aren't far behind. New Orleans is 4-0 against 2020 playoff teams, having beaten Green Bay, Washington, Seattle and Tampa Bay.

### Bracing for impact

While New Orleans boasts the NFL's No. 1 run defense and Henry is out with a broken right foot, Davis doesn't envision Tennessee abandoning its ground game.

"Any time you want to be an attacking, physical team and run the ball, you can't just do that with one guy," Davis said. "Even though they have one of the top, if not the best, running back in the league, you still have to have other guys that can get the job done. They have good running backs by committee and guys who can come in and get the job done."

One of those replacements is Adrian Peterson, now in his 15th season at 36. Saints coach Sean Payton coached Peterson for four games with New Orleans in 2017, and he said the 2012 NFL MVP is the one player he has coached knowing Peterson had a different body clock than anyone else.

"He still has power," Payton said. "You can see it. That surge on his touchdown run the other night was impressive, and he takes care of himself well. He's one of those unique athletes. It doesn't surprise you."

### Ball security

The Saints, who gave up a touchdown last week after a sack-strip of Siemian was returned deep into New Orleans territory, are re-establishing a big emphasis on protecting the ball. It's not just because of the bitter memories.

Tennessee has seven interceptions and four fumble recoveries in its past five games. Safety Kevin Byard has led the way, and he has six takeaways this season. He's also the only player in the league this season to

## Wildcats see chance to end losing streak

NASHVILLE — A season that started so very well for the Kentucky Wildcats has hit such a skid that coach Mark Stoops isn't taking any team for granted.

Not even Vanderbilt, which has lost 18 straight Southeastern Conference football games.

"No matter who we're playing, it's about us, the situation that we're in, how we react to what happened to us (last week) and the way we played and that will determine the outcome of this week," Stoops said. "Just how we handle it, how we prepare, how we get ready."

Kentucky (6-3, 4-3) started the season with a six-game winning streak and big wins over Florida and LSU in league play.

Now the Wildcats have lost three straight, the last knocking them out of the Top 25 after a 45-42 loss to Tennessee despite dominating almost every offensive category. Kentucky piled up 612 yards for a nice rebound after offensive clunkers at Georgia and Mississippi State.

"I can promise you there's a lot of guys in that building that are just motivated to move on and try to go get the next victory," Stoops said.

Vanderbilt (2-7, 0-5) still is looking for its first SEC win under first-year coach Clark Lea.

The Commodores also are trying to end a skid in league play that is now 18 straight dating back to a win over Missouri on Oct. 19, 2019. They are coming off an open date to rest up from losing four straight, including a

## Panthers bring QB Newton back home

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Sherman has returned.

Whether or not Cam Newton can rescue the Carolina Panthers' sinking season remains to be seen.

The Panthers (4-5) announced they've signed Newton to a one-year contract, bringing him back to the franchise that drafted him No. 1 overall in 2011 — and later cut him prior to the 2020 season after he lost eight straight games as a starter.

The deal is worth \$10 million, including \$4.5 million in fully guaranteed money and a \$1.5 million roster bonus, according to a person familiar with the situation. The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because the team does not announce financial terms of players' contracts.

"A healthy Cam Newton is a special player," Panthers coach Matt Rhule said.

Carolina was in need of a quarterback after an MRI on Monday revealed starter Sam Darnold would miss at least four weeks with a incomplete fracture of his right shoulder blade. Rhule said he called Newton on Tuesday night to gauge his interest in returning to Carolina,

and the quarterback was excited about the possibility.

"He loves Charlotte. He loves the Carolina Panthers. He made that very clear to me," Rhule said.

Rhule said P.J. Walker will still start Sunday against the Arizona Cardinals and Matt Barkley, signed off the Tennessee Titans practice squad earlier in the week, will serve as his primary backup. Rhule isn't sure if Newton would be active this week because he hasn't practiced yet.

Rhule wouldn't speculate on if Newton would be the starter beyond this week, but general manager Scott Fitterer said Newton "came here to play" — and the money the Panthers invested in him for the final eight games of the season is a strong indication they plan on him being more than just a backup.

Panthers cornerback Stephon Gilmore, who grew up about 30 minutes from Charlotte and played with Newton in New England, spoke to the importance of the QB's return to the Carolinas.

"There's a lot of important people in South Carolina and North Carolina, but Cam Newton is probably right up there at the top two or top one," Gilmore said.

Outside the gates of Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium, a fan wearing Newton's No. 1 jersey stood waiting for the QB to arrive and greeted people entering the facility with a giddy smile saying "this feels like Christmas to me."

Inside the empty bowl of the stadium the team lit up the scoreboards with the words "He's Back."

Newton met with owner David Tepper and Fitterer earlier in the day and later passed his physical. His plan was to stay late into the night to learn the team's playbook. He's expected to join his new teammates at practice on Friday.

"We had a heartfelt, sincere discussion with him and it wasn't about anything in the past," Fitterer said. "It was more about what are we going to do now moving forward and what is Cam's role and how can he help us and what can we do to support him."

Newton is expected to address the media on Friday.

Newton spent nine seasons with the Panthers, throwing for 29,041 yards with 182 touchdown passes and 111 interceptions. He also set an NFL record for most career touchdowns rushing by a quarterback

score on a fumble recovery and a pick-6 — the first of his career.

“If you feel like you watch enough film and you got a good bead on what’s about to happen, go out there and make a play,” Byard said.

### Passing paucity

The Saints rank next to last in the NFL in yards passing — a stark contrast from when Payton’s offenses led the NFL in passing six times with Drew Brees behind center.

Sometimes the Saints have kept the ball on the ground by design and leaned on their 10th-ranked running game averaging 123 yards per game. Last week, anemia in the passing game for most of the first three quarters caught up with them as they fell behind 24-6 to Atlanta.

The Titans come in tied for fifth in the NFL with 23 sacks, led by linebacker Harold Landry with nine.

Defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons is coming off a career-best game with three sacks against the Rams and is a big reason they are second over the past five weeks with 96 quarterback pressures.

back during his tenure in Carolina.

He won league MVP honors in 2015 when he combined for a career-best 45 touchdowns — 35 passing and 10 rushing — and helped the Panthers go 15-1 during the regular season and reach Super Bowl 50. However, Newton struggled mightily on the game’s biggest stage and the Panthers lost 24-10 to Von Miller, Peyton Manning and the Denver Broncos.

He’s not been able to return to that MVP level since.

Shortly after Matt Rhule was hired in 2020, the Panthers cut Newton with questions surrounding the strength of his surgically repaired shoulder and a foot injury.

The move saved Carolina \$19.1 million under the salary cap.

“We made a football decision at the time based on his health,” Rhule said. “Cam understands that these are football decisions and football-based evaluations that you have to make. ... He’s healthy now and you see he’s healthy. As he said to me, he’s as healthy as he possibly could be.”

# Odell Beckham Jr. agrees to deal with Rams

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — When the Los Angeles Rams learned they had a chance to land Odell Beckham Jr., their veterans assembled in the locker room Thursday morning. Jalen Ramsey made a call, and the Rams took turns recruiting the veteran receiver to their West Coast home.

“Felt like college, huh?” receiver Robert Woods said with a grin.

The Rams clearly sold themselves and their Super Bowl vision quite well to the mercurial receiver.

Beckham agreed to a one-year deal with Los Angeles, choosing this burgeoning super team over several potential free-agent destinations.

The Browns released the disgruntled Beckham on Monday, midway through his third season in Cleveland. He cleared waivers Tuesday with no team willing to pick up the \$7.25 million he was owed under his last contract, freeing the five-time 1,000-yard wideout to sign with any team.

After considering his options and getting the full-court press from his future teammates, Beckham elected to join NFL yards passing leader Matthew Stafford and coach Sean McVay in the league’s most productive passing offense.

“I have a lot of respect for who he is as a player,” said Stafford, who played with Beckham in a Pro Bowl. “It’s an opportunity for us as a team. It’s an opportunity for him to come in here and prove himself to us. What our room is about, the receiver room, is pretty special. I know he’ll

fit right in and just continue to get better, and hopefully it will help us as a team.”

The Rams swooped in fairly late in the courtship. They closed the deal with the swashbuckling flair that’s defined their front office under general manager Les Snead, who has rarely faced a salary cap challenge he couldn’t overcome.

The three-time Pro Bowl selection will play alongside NFL receiving leader Cooper Kupp — who has 74 catches for 1,019 yards and 10 TDs, all tops in the league — and starters Robert Woods (556 yards) and second-year pro Van Jefferson (443 yards). One of those three receivers is likely to see less playing time after Beckham joins the Rams, who have run offensive sets featuring three receivers almost exclusively this season.

That’s not a concern, according to the receivers who will be affected. With Stafford and McVay calling the shots, they believe everybody can thrive and win.

“We’re all working for the same goal,” Woods said. “His thing is, I feel like, why he left — he wanted to be a part of it and contribute, and I think just coming into this offense, he wants to work and contribute. We’re all working toward the same goal: winning, grinding. I don’t think it should be anything disruptive.”

The Rams (7-2) visit the San Francisco 49ers on Monday night before their bye week.

Beckham is the second veteran NFL star in the past two weeks to join the Rams, who seem to be trying everything to emerge from a

crowded NFC so they can play in February’s Super Bowl at their own SoFi Stadium in Inglewood.

Los Angeles traded for Von Miller last week, sending two high draft picks to Denver for the vaunted pass-rushing linebacker. Miller has yet to debut for LA, but he was among those recruiting Beckham by phone.

The Rams also don’t hesitate to add talent even to areas in which they’re strong: Miller joined a defense that already leads the NFL in sacks, while Beckham is joining an offense that DeSean Jackson left two weeks ago because he couldn’t get playing time in front of LA’s three starters.

Kupp and Woods emerged from their discussions confident Beckham wants to buy in.

“I think the thing about playing here is when you’re not about what we’re about, when you’re not about playing for the guys next to you, I think you can stick out like a sore thumb,” Kupp said. “We have a great culture here. Guys play for each other. They work day in and day out so that when we step on the field, you are taking care of the guy next to you.”

The Rams ardently chased Beckham before he was traded to Cleveland by the Giants in March 2019, and McVay has spoken glowingly of Beckham’s talents over the years. Beckham’s speed, athleticism and ball skills should provide a welcome option for the Rams, who are already back among the NFL’s top offensive teams after a two-year lull.

Lakers star LeBron James wel-

comed Beckham on Twitter shortly before the deal was announced: “Welcome to LA my brother @obj! It’s GO TIME!!”

They are close friends, and Beckham — who already has a home in Los Angeles — has been making regular offseason appearances courtside at Staples Center since even before LeBron arrived in 2018.

The 29-year-old Beckham has the chance to revitalize his career with the Rams after his tenure in Cleveland never got rolling and eventually came to a fairly ugly finish.

After missing the end of last season with a knee injury, he has only 17 catches for 232 yards and zero touchdowns in six games this year. His father recently shared a video master cut of Browns quarterback Baker Mayfield not getting the ball to Beckham, essentially forcing the breakup with Cleveland.

Browns safety John Johnson, who spent the past four seasons with the Rams, was on a Zoom call with Cleveland reporters when the news of Beckham’s signing broke. Johnson wondered how OBJ will fit in LA.

“They had a good thing going, like a complete offense,” Johnson said. “I just feel like, from being in LA, I know for a fact the offense runs through Cooper Kupp. Even in the run game, the pass game, the screen game, it kind of runs through Cooper Kupp. So obviously, Odell’s a big name and he’s going to want that attention as well. It will be interesting.”

# Rodgers’ vaccine comments may test clout with sponsors

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Green Bay Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers could be playing football again less than two weeks after testing positive for COVID-19 and misleading everyone about being an unvaccinated player.

Whether the off-field consequences of the reigning MVP’s science-defying explanation for why he chose not to get the shot have a similarly short shelf life remains uncertain.

Rodgers is one of the NFL’s most visible players. His appearances on State Farm commercials make him a ubiquitous presence even on game telecasts that don’t involve the Packers.

His comments regarding his vaccination status could put that marketability to the test.

“It’s unlikely right now given the volatility of the situation that he’s going to

have new people coming out and wanting to form a partnership with him, but I think it’s also unlikely that you’re going to have companies split with him,” said Patrick Rishe, the director of the sports business program at Washington University in St. Louis.

State Farm stood by Rodgers earlier this week, saying that it disagrees with some of Rodgers’ statements but respects his right to have his own personal point of view.

The revelation that Rodgers never got vaccinated for COVID-19 came after he tested positive on Nov. 3, causing him to miss the Packers’ 13-7 loss at Kansas City. The earliest he could return to the team is Saturday, which would enable him to play Sunday when the Packers host the Seattle Seahawks.

Assuming he does play Sunday, the reception Rodgers gets from the

home crowd could provide some early hints on whether this episode has impacted his popularity at all.

Ashley Dabb, a visiting sports marketing professor at St. Joseph’s University, says the biggest issue is that Rodgers initially was misleading about his vaccination status.

Rodgers said during a Nov. 5 appearance on “The Pat McAfee Show” that teammates, Packers officials and league officials knew he was unvaccinated. But when he was asked in an Aug. 26 news conference whether he was vaccinated, Rodgers had replied, “Yeah, I’m immunized.”

“Ultimately the heart of the matter is the fact there’s now a trust consideration,” Dabb said. “Rodgers is now taking full responsibility for the statements, but the fact that he was misleading I think would give any brand pause, not

to say they wouldn’t eventually sponsor him, but it’s a serious consideration when you’re not sure if the athlete you’re working with would be truthful in all matters.”

The NFL fined Rodgers and teammate Allen Lazard each \$14,650, and the Packers \$300,000 for violations of protocols. Those protocol violations included the unvaccinated Rodgers appearing unmasked at news conferences.

Rodgers appeared on “The Pat McAfee Show” again Tuesday and stood behind the comments he made last week about why he didn’t get vaccinated, but he also took full responsibility for misleading some people about his status.

“I shared an opinion that’s polarizing,” Rodgers said. “I get it. And I misled some people about my status, which I take full

responsibility of, those comments. But in the end, I have to stay true to who I am and what I’m about.”

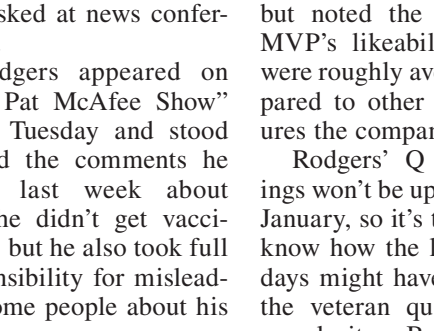
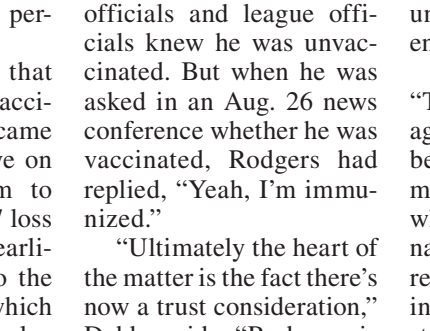
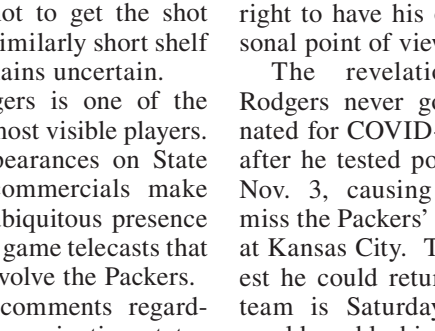
Henry Schafer is the executive vice president of The Q Scores Company, which measures the awareness and likeability of personalities in various professions. Schafer said the public awareness level of Rodgers ranks behind that of only Tom Brady among active NFL players but noted the three-time MVP’s likeability ratings were roughly average compared to other sports figures the company tracked.

Rodgers’ Q Score ratings won’t be updated until January, so it’s too soon to know how the last several days might have impacted the veteran quarterback’s popularity. But Schafer believes Rodgers helped himself by taking responsibility for misleading the general public about his vaccination status.
