# **Contract on** table for new City Manager

### One Council member says 'no'

During its regular monthly meeting Thursday night, Shelbyville City Council voted 5 to 1 to place a contract on the table with recent applicant Gregory Scott Collins for the open position of City manager.

Councilman Henry Feldhaus made the motion to authorize Municipal Technical Advisory Service (MTAS) and City Attorney Ginger Shofner to present a contract for the position of City manager to applicant Collins.

Collins' being hired as City manager is contingent on a background check and drug test. Council member Stephanie Isaacs seconded the motion to negotiate a contract with Collins.

salary offer discussed was between \$90 to \$145,000. No definite salary amount has been approved.

Shofner Attorney stated that she would get a draft to the Council for them to work out the details. Council member Ewing stated for the record she was "not really in favor of this."

The vote to negotiate a potential contract with Collins passed 5 to 1 with Ewing casting the only no' vote.

Ewing told the T-G: "I feel every part of City administration

as well as well elected officials are crucial when making decisions for any and all communities. I am not one to quickly make a decision on a lot of things, so choosing a City manager amplifies this process for me since so many actions, decisions and protecting this community placed with the individual serving in this position."

Ewing said she feels Council should continue the interview process with other applicants. "I do not have a good feeling with Mr. Collins based on my personal background research."

Collins, a resident of Caryville, is the former City manager of Fayetteville.

Council member Ewing said this position's contract can be very complex with financial responsibility taxpayers when it comes to relocation and moving fees, a great salary and whether there's payout upon leaving the position,

"With such a short term with our last City manager, I would rather take more time to make a much better and fitting decision. I will certainly work with any individual who lands the position, because it's all about the citizens."

# **Leaky water pipes** disrupting Wartrace

### Loss estimated at \$21,000 a month

In July, the Wartrace water system lost over 40 percent of their purchased water from Tullahoma due to pipe leaks, according to the utility reports. That's down from June where they lost closer to 50 percent.

The loss costs the city about \$21,000 per month. Wartrace has higher water rates than other municipalities but it's not solely from the leaks.

Wartrace has about 100 miles of water pipes that span from the town itself to Tullahoma to Beech Grove to the Highway 41A-64 intersection, according to former Wartrace mayor and Commissioner Don Gallagher. It's a lot of maintenance. This is coupled with the fact most of the water pipes are from the 1930s.

According to Mayor Cindy Drake, the town's water department ended 2021 with a loss of profit.

The Town of Wartrace will be having a public meeting at town hall at 6 p.m. Thursday. All community members are

#### The water rates

So as of July 1, the town switched its water rates to be consumptionbased, with city limit residents paying \$20.55 minimum and outside city limit residents paying \$50.20, with a \$7.20 per 1,000-gallon rate for both types of

Before, the system was spread out among all the consumers. Drake explained if a resident used 20,000 gallons, the prices would be about the same as someone using 200,000 gallons.

"And that's not fair. Everybody should pay for their own consumption," said


Bedford County Board of Education has changed its meeting night to the third Thursday of each month at 6, effective Aug. 18.

Items on the agenda to be discussed Thursday night at the Central Office board room include the ESSER Public Plan and the SAVE Act 2022-2023. (See Saturday's Times-Gazette for story.)

Other items of discussion include the use of the internet, which is policy 4.406. The current policy online reads as follows:

"The Board supports the right of staff and students to have reasonable access to various information formats and believes it incumbent upon staff and students to use this privilege in an appropriate and responsible manner. The purpose of this policy and the corresponding user agreements is to assure that users recognize the procedures which the school system imposes on their use of the Internet per stipulations of the Children's Online Protection Act 47 USC Section 231 (COPPA), the

same people who put them in office." She said her water bill was \$86.70 for 29 days of consumption, which was up from \$72.56 for 31 days the previous month. Drake said Wartrace

city residents also have to pay a sewer fee, which costs around \$20. In the city, the bill is split in two, while in the county, there is just one bill, she explained. This practice of splitting

these rates is common, according to Gallagher. "I know it doesn't sound fair but it's a normal practice in utility districts," he said.

"If you lived in town, the houses are close together. The maintenance and upkeep of the line isn't anything like it is if you live out in the country. It costs a lot more to maintain the system outside of town," the Gallagher explained.

#### Wartrace water history Wartrace began paying

for water consumption from Tullahoma around 2010 when the Cascade Spring water source was condemned by the water district, according to Gallagher. He said they knew contaminates were building up in the spring due to industrial development as well as E. coli contamination. Wartrace was given the

choice to build a filtration plant for \$4 million (which wouldn't do anything, about chemicals, only bacteria, according to Gallagher) or find a new source of water.

So, from the mid-1930s to 2010, water was essentially free for the town while the fee paid by leak repairs. The rate had not changed since 2010, according to Drake. The town will also

study through Municipal Technical Advisory Service with the University of Tennessee (MTAS), which will make sure their rates are where they're supposed to be, Drake said. "What we don't want is for the state to set our

rates," said Drake. "The state is going to look even further down the road and set the rates high enough so we will definitely have a profit." Compared to other

cities and counties, Drake said Wartrace's rates are close to Manchester's. "I checked everybody's rates, and everybody charges more in the county than they do in the city. And you have to because it's more pipe per household," said Drake. "And it's hard to find somebody who serves the city and county like we Those under Bedford

County Utility District pay a rate of \$17 per 1,500 gallons. Shelbyville pays \$13.40 for 1,000 gallons. For those outside the city, it's \$15.20 for the first 1,000 gallons. Those in Flat Creek have to pay \$20.20 for the first 1,500 gallons.

Drake said the reason a city like Shelbyville has a smaller rate is because they have less pipes and more people (some 25,000) to pay for it. According to Gallagher, Wartrace has 100 miles of pipes and less than 1,300 paying for them.

Gallagher said the best way to deal with this issue is to identify those sections of line that have the worst leaks- those out toward the Fairfield community and Bugscuffle Road. Then, with those specifics, apply for a grant.


# Old pieces of cloth Artist uses textiles to 'tell stories'

**T-G STAFF REPORT** edford County Arts Council hosted mixed media textile artist Julie Barrett Cataldo at its monthly potluck at the Fly Arts Center Monday.

Barrett Cataldo is current Bell Buckle Arts Council president. She and other Arts Council members work to keep the arts scene in Bell Buckle "vibrant and active" with such initiatives as Art Saturday pop-ups and an Art Alley. This features a curated collection of artist's booths during the Webb School Arts and Crafts Fair, among other community projects.

Personally, Barrett Cataldo said she makes art that tells stories—some true and some embellished. These stories are told by combining modern and

vintage portraits printed onto an eco-canvas fabric, with paint, reclaimed textiles, and vintage notions.

Each portrait has a uniquely designed, handmade garment that is hand sewn onto the canvas. These garments can be seen spilling out from the painting in three dimensions. She clothes each of her portrait subjects "like royalty."

Her art also has a purpose.

Barrett Cataldo has a line of self-care products like dream pillows, sleep masks, and meditation masks. The pillows all feature an original painting printed onto an eco-canvas front with reclaimed textiles on the back. She said these products are designed to help people create their own stories for their homes.

#### FARMERS MARKET

It's going strong. The rains have helped some of the late crop and the continuing blooming plants. Vendor numbers are good, and variety is good.

#### **WHAT'S WRONG WITH THIS?**

I had a pear brought by with some specks and rotten areas. I sent photos to the lab and Dr. Eleanor sent back a diagnosis of pear scab. The black specks were actually some lesions of disease activity and the rotten areas were caused by this pathogen.

I've attached a picture of the pear with the damage. Treatment involves a year-round fruit spray protocol as outlined in one of our publications, Disease and Insect Control of Home Fruit Plantings, pub

1622. I'll be happy to share this one with anyone needing the information.

The protocol involves year-round care, not just when the fruit appears and then with a problem. The problems start well ahead of fruit appearance. This protocol covers diseases, fungal problems, and insect damage that occurs during the bud and loom

The one thing not in this publication is what to do when the squirrels attack the fruit! Melody called me the other day to give me the news that the "tree rats" had damaged all but one pear on both of our little pear trees. She was

stems from an old family heirloom tree. I'm at a loss as to what to do, but I'll think about it. Now, except for the one pear left, I've got several months to come up with a solution, if there is one!

#### **MAKING IT THROUGH**

Most everyone is short on hay. And buying hay is not much of an option, since the western hay growers have experienced even worse growing conditions than we have. And even if it's available, it's very costly.

I've had discussions with a lot of cattle growers about options. We need to think outside of the box. Doing something is better than doing nothing and hoping that things will work out. There appears to be some choices. Here's what some are considering.

One is to cull down to a more manageable level. And selling calves early is an option. This will allow these cows to mend back and reduce their nutrient needs. These may be options, and they may not. This is for you to decide.

Some are looking at planting some forage crops to help out grazing conditions. This option might work for several folks. No-tilling various combinations of wheat, cereal rye, ryegrass and/ or triticale will produce forage that will be a grazing resource for several months. You can plant at a shallow depth into the sod with this moisture. This will help reduce the dependence on the short hay supply. Our experiment station farms are doing this

to have enough feed for the dairy herds and the beef cattle herds. We'll be sharing the recipes and budgets with you shortly.

If this is an option, the planting time is here, and with the moisture that we have had, this is a good time to consider this move and do something about it. What's the costs to do this? Let me answer that with another question, what's the costs of hay if you can

With any grazing effort, cross-fencing is a good management tool. Rotating pastures will give your animals fresh forages on a timely basis, allow time for regrowth, and manure management on a larger area will help feed the plants.

A soil test to help determine pH issues is highly recommended. A good pH encourages root development and allows for better use of available plant nutrients. Lime is still the least expensive soil additive for plant growth. When is the right time to apply lime? When you can get a spreader truck in and out without getting stuck! You may be surprised at how much grass you have if you get the pH into the right

range. As you can see, there are a lot of moving parts in managing to make it through this feeding dilemma. But it can be doable. The key here is the 'do' part of doable. Doing nothing is not a good option. Take a look at options for your operation. Then make some decisions but only after gathering information on what, how, when, needs,

# Raus' Roberts Farm dates back to 1811

Celebrated Century Farm

**T-G STAFF REPORT** 

Changing priorities in agricultural production, from corn cultivation in the early 1800s to dairy farming at the turn of the century to cattle production today, characterize the history of the Roberts Farmone still celebrated as a Tennessee Century Farm.

Established by Thomas Roberts of Virginia on land located 10 miles southeast of Shelbyville, the Roberts Farm dates to 1811. Thomas and his wife Betsy Lacy began farming with 117 acres and they purchased 114 additional acres in 1819. Similar to many early Middle Tennessee farmers, they produced corn, hay, and cattle.

Thomas and Betsy's only son, Thomas Lacy Roberts, was the second generation owner. He married Priscilla Parker and they raised 11 children. Together the family operated a 400 acre farm, which yielded corn, hay, cattle, and timber.

The crops produced at the Roberts Farm would change during the third generation ownership of Columbus Daniel (born 1856) and Fannie Ferguson Roberts (born 1867.) Sadly, Columbus passed in 1895 at age 39, but Fannie lived on to age 85.

When the founders' great-grandson, Claude D. Roberts, assumed ownership of the property during the 20th century, he added dairy cattle to the farm's products and also operated a grist mill in the Raus community.

In 1969, Claude and his wife Pauline's only child, Winston D. Roberts, inherited 104 acres of original family land. Winston passed away in 2015; his daughters, Carol and Dorothy, presently manage the farm which specializes in cattle and hay produc-

Carol now serves as archivist for Bedford County and formerly worked with the State of Tennessee as director of preservation.

The Century Farm legacy lives on within the Roberts family.

#### **About TN Century Farms**

According to Tennessee Department of Agriculture, the Tennessee Century Farms Programs, administered by the Center for Historic Preservation (CHP) at Middle Tennessee State University, identifies, documents, and recognizes farms owned by the same family for at least 100 years.

To date, nearly 2,100 Tennessee Century Farms have been certified.


CHP maintains the Century Farm database of information and photographs, most of which is based on applications supplied by the farm families. Tennessee Agriculture: A Century Farms Perspective was published by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture and the Center in 1986. The book-length study includes descriptions of each farm and both color and black and white photographs.

Century Farms Program established shared interests among the CHP, local historical societies, county extension offices, city and county governments, and chambers of commerce. The bond was

strengthened with the traveling exhibit, "Tennessee's Century Farms: Change and Continuity over 200 Years of Farming." Funded by the Center and the Tennessee Humanities Council, it toured the state in 1988-89.

Taking rural preservation work in new directions, Center staff successfully nominated several historic family farms to the National Register of Historic Places. This work paved the way for the innovative Historic Family Farms of Middle Tennessee multiple property nomination.

Considered a model for rural preservation, this was the first thematic nomina-

tion in the country to deal with historic farmsteads. The CHP, working with the Tennessee Department of Agriculture and the Tennessee Historical Commission, serves as a clearing house of information on the Tennessee Century Farms Program, National Register Documentation of farms, and as national leader in documentation and interpretation of historic family



# July sets new record for overnight

Talk about hot nights, America got some for the history books last month.

The continental United States in July set a record for overnight warmth, providing little relief from the day's sizzling heat for people, animals, plants and the electric grid, meteorologists said.

average

temperature for the Lower 48 states in July was 63.6 degrees (17.6 Celsius), which beat the previous record set in 2011 by a few hundredths of a degree. The mark is not only the hottest nightly average for July, but for any month in 128 years of record keeping, said National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration climatologist Gleason. July's nighttime low was more than 3 degrees (1.7 Celsius) warmer than the 20th century average.

Scientists have long talked about nighttime temperatures -- reflected in increasingly hotter minimum readings that usually occur after sunset and before sunrise -- being crucial to health. "When you

daytime temperatures that are at or near record high temperatures and you don't have that recovery overnight with temperatures cooling off, it does place a lot of stress Friday. "It's a big deal."

"Global warming is continuing on pace," Colorado meteorologist Bob Henson said.

# **Titans'** Willis takes to air

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans have a competition for the job backing up Ryan Tannehill, and coach Mike Vrabel has made it very clear they want rookie Malik Willis throwing more.

Vrabel pulled Willis two plays into Tennessee's first drive of the third quarter after the quarterback scrambled on the second play for 17 yards in the Titans' 23-10 loss Thursday night to Baltimore. Willis showed off his scrambling ability running five times for 38 yards with a touchdown, and his strong arm was on display with a 48-yard toss to Racey McMath.

An impressive debut that had the rookie trending with video snippets of his highlights all over social media. Yet Willis finished with only one more completion than rushes, going 6 of 11 for 107 yards while being sacked twice.

And the Titans lost.

"We wanted him to rip it, and he didn't," Vrabel said Friday. "And so I'm sure he'll rip it the next time that he has an opportunity."

The Titans traded up to draft Willis at No. 86 overall out of Liberty in April, and they've been giving the rookie as much experience as possible this preseason. Willis has had opportunities to work with the secondteam offense during training camp, and he started against Baltimore over Logan Woodside, who has been Tannehill's backup the past two seasons.

Vrabel said they knew the Ravens would give them multiple looks and pressures. The challenge for Willis is what Vrahel called the "fine line" between moving around inside the pocket tapping into the drills they practice every day and working through his reads to find receivers.

"And then there's times where we're going to want him to go and be an athlete," Vrabel said. "And so there's some things we have to work on with ... certainly the timing and what he's seeing when those throws depend on it. And then there's other times that I thought he really made some nice plays down the field and and kept his eyes down the field."

One came on the play to McMath to set up a field goal in the second quarter. Willis also completed a sidearm throw around a defender to tight end Tommy Hudson. Willis took a sack just before halftime when he held onto the ball too long while in the pocket, then threw the ball away a couple of plays later.

Vrabel said it's just execution and where Willis' eyes are progressing through his reads. The work continues Saturday in camp, and the Titans also have a pair of joint practices with the first Wednesday with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers ahead of their exhibition Aug. 20 in Nashville.

"This is all happening pretty quick and much quicker with more consequences in the game than what it's been in practice," Vrabel said.

Woodside has had little competition in backing up Tannehill the past two seasons, playing in 11 games. The quarterback drafted in the seventh round out of Toledo in 2018 by Cincinnati spent the first three weeks on the Titans' practice squad in 2018 and all of 2019 injured on the

practice squad.

# Former Titan focuses on Bills starting job

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. — Rodger Saffold is so excited to be back practicing since recovering from rib injuries sustained in a car accident, the Buffalo veteran offensive lineman doesn't mind being used as "a dummy."

That's the term Saffold used on Sunday in explaining how Buffalo's new offensive line coach Aaron Kromer is leaning on the 13-year veteran to visually display various new techniques to his teammates. Though Saffold is new to Buffalo after signing with the team this offseason, he feels more at home after having played under Kromer when their careers overlapped with the Los Angeles Rams from 2017-18.

"It's been an easy transition," Saffold said. "It's actually been easier than I ever though it could

The only thing to have slowed the 34-year-old's bid to fill the starting job at left guard is a car accident he was involved in before the start of training camp last month.

Speaking to the media for the first time this summer, Saffold declined to go into much detail by calling it a traumatic experience. He would only say the crash happened in Los Angeles, where he has an offseason home, and that no one was seriously injured. Saffold said he didn't realize

the extent of his rib injuries until he arrived in Buffalo and began working out at the team's facility last month. He missed the first two weeks of training camp before being activated from the non-football injury list on Aug. 7.

With 157 starts in 160 career games, Saffold doesn't believe it will take long to make up for the time he's lost.

Aside from his ties to Kromer, Saffold also has a connection to left tackle Dion Dawkins after the two worked out and played together at the Pro Bowl this offseason.

Buffalo's projected starting offensive line is gradually taking shape. Aside from Saffold missing time, right guard Ryan Bates missed several practices, while right tackle Spencer Brown was gradually eased into the mix after having offseason back surgery. The only constant on the line has been center Mitch Morse.

It's unclear if members of the starting five will see any preseason action after sitting out Buffalo's 27-24 preseason-opening win over Indianapolis on Saturday.

It makes no difference to Saffold whether he plays or not before the Bills open the season at the Rams on Sept. 8.

"I've had no preseason games, I've done all the preseason games ... and to be honest, I've done this so many times you know how to make yourself ready," said Saffold, who spent his first nine NFL seasons with the Rams and the previous three in Tennessee.

#### A leg up?

Impressive as Bills rookie Matt Araiza's 82-yard punt was against the Colts, coach Sean McDermott is far from ready to award him the job ahead of returning veteran Matt Haack.

"That was good, and I'm not dismissing it. It was a great punt, but it was one punt," McDermott

The coach then turned the attention to Haack by noting the fifth-year player deftly landed a 38-yard punt at the Colts 12 in the first quarter.

Araiza is a sixth-round pick

out of San Diego State, where he earned the nickname "Punt God" for his booming left leg. His 82-yarder happened in the final minute of the second quarter, with the ball sailing over the head of Colts returner Phillip Lindsay before dribbling over the goal line for a touchback.

# **Harvick wins Richmond for** 2nd straight

RICHMOND, Va. — Kevin Harvick may be stamping himself as the man to beat in NASCAR.

The 2014 series champion took the lead from Joey Logano with 66 laps to go and held off Christopher Bell at Richmond Raceway on Sunday for his second consecutive NASCAR Cup Series victory.

Harvick, who ended a 65-race drought last week at Michigan, won for the 60th time, the fourth time at Richmond and first time on the 0.75-mile oval since 2013. He matched Kyle Busch for ninth in career victories in the premier series and credited an increased understanding of the Next Gen car for his progress.

"We're just going to keep doing the things that we're doing," Harvick said. "I think we just have to keep an open mind about things and keep progressing and keep understanding the car, understanding what we could have done better today, understanding what we could have done better in qualifying yesterday and do the same thing over and over," he said after climbing from his car.

He even took some blame for allowing Bell to come so

"I knew he was coming, but I forgot to shift down the front straightaway the last time," he said. "I was not paying attention and he got closer than he should have. I made a mistake there a couple laps doing the same thing."

Harvick's victory also kept alive the intriguing battle for the final playoff position with two races remaining in the regular season. The 15 winners this year have all likely claimed playoff berths unless there are new winners when the series moves to Watkins Glen and then Daytona.

Bell finished second, followed by Chris Buescher, Denny Hamlin and Chase Elliott. Joey Logano, who led for 222 of the 400 laps, faded to sixth, followed by Martin Truex Jr. Ryan Blaney was 10th. Blaney and Truex are the top two drivers in points hoping to make the 16-driver playoffs without a victory.

Thanks to stage points, Blaney increased his lead from 19 points to 26 over Truex for the final playoff spot, assuming there is not a 16th different winner.

The race featured just five cautions for 28 laps, and that includes the two that come at the end of each stage. The last one came when Bell spun on the 252nd lap, and Harvick pulled away after a pair of green-flag pit cycles.

The final pit stops under green came with just more than 50 laps to go.

"I got held up pretty bad at the beginning of the run by a couple slower cars and that was ultimately the difference when you get beat by a couple car lengths," Bell said. He locked up a playoff spot with a win at Loudon on July 17.

Before Bell, Buescher was on Harvick's bumper, but never got around him.

"I think it's a little easy with this format to feel like third

place doesn't matter, but it's nice to be close and to keep progressing and getting better," he said. "Just burned the rear tires up. Ultimately that's on me. Lap traffic didn't do us any favors, either, but ultimately just got to keep the rears under us a little bit better so we can have a little bit better shot there to get after him for the win."

### Man drives into fundraiser crowd, then kills mother

BERWICK, Pa. (AP) — Pennsylvania state police say a man who was upset about an argument with his mother drove through a crowd at a fundraiser for victims of a recent deadly house fire, killing one person at the event and injuring 17 others, then returned home and beat his mother to

Police identified the driver as 24-year-old Adrian Oswaldo Sura Reyes of Nescopeck, who was arraigned early Sunday on two counts of criminal homicide.

Police allege in a criminal complaint that Sura Reyes said he argued with his mother at their Nescopeck home Saturday evening and while driving through nearby Berwick was "extremely frustrated" and was "tired of fighting with his mother, including about money, and wanted to be done

At the time, police said, a crowd of about 75 people, including adults and small children, had gathered in a blocked-off parking lot in Berwick outside the Intoxicology Department bar, which was holding an all-day fundraising event to benefit victims of the Aug. 5 blaze in Nescopeck that killed seven adults and three children.

Police say Sura Reyes told them he drove past the gathering, then turned around and headed back to the bar "to drive through the crowd of people." Investigators asked how fast he drove into the crowd and Sura Reyes replied "speeding

"Video surveillance gathered by the Pennsylvania State Police corroborates Sura Reves's statement that he sped up into the crowd purposefully," according to the criminal

Geisinger Medical Center said it received 15 patients after the crash, and five remained in critical condition while three were listed in fair condition, a hospital spokesperson said Sunday morning. Seven patients had been treated at hospitals and released.

Trooper Anthony Petroski III told reporters late Saturday that Sura Reyes was not currently a suspect in the fire, the cause of which remains under investigation.

"This is a complete tragedy in a community where there's already been tragedy," Petroski said.

Shortly after the crash was reported, troopers were called about a man "physically assaulting" a woman less than two miles away in Nescopeck. Troopers arrived to find local police had arrested Sura Reyes and a woman was dead.

Luzerne County Coroner Francis Hacken confirmed Sunday that the victim, Rosa D. Reyes, 56, of Nescopeck, was the mother of Sura Reyes and had died of multiple traumatic injuries after being hit by a vehicle and assaulted with a hammer.

In the criminal complaint, police say Sura Reyes told investigators he saw his mother in the street upon returning home and struck her with his vehicle, then hit her with a hammer several times.

Sura Reyes was denied bail and remained in Columbia County prison pending an Aug. 29 preliminary hearing. News outlets reported that he said "Sorry" in response to reporters' questions as he was taken from Shickshinny police station. It wasn't immediately clear whether he had a

lawyer to comment on his behalf. The first funerals for victims of the fire were held Friday,

and more were scheduled for Sunday and Monday. = The bar called the events an "absolute tragedy" and said on its Facebook page that they will be closed until further notice and would like privacy "while we grieve add try to

# Fire at Cairo Coptic church kills 41

CAIRO (AP) — A fire ripped through a packed Coptic Orthodox church during morning services in Egypt's capital on Sunday, quickly filling it with thick black smoke and killing 41 worshippers, including at least 15 children.

Several trapped congregants jumped from upper floors of the Martyr Abu Sefein church to try to escape the intense flames, witnesses said. "Suffocation, suffocation, all of them dead," said a distraught witness, who only gave a partial name, Abu Bishoy.

Sixteen people were injured, including four policemen involved in the rescue effort.

The cause of the blaze at the church in the working-class neighborhood of Imbaba was not immediately known. An initial investigation pointed to an electrical short-circuit, according to a police statement.

Weeping families waited outside for word about relatives who were inside the church and at nearby hospitals where the victims were taken. Footage from the scene circulated online showed burned furniture, including wooden tables and chairs. Firefighters were seen putting out the blaze while others carried victims to ambulances.

Witnesses said there were many children inside the four-story building, which had two day care facili-

"There are children, we didn't know how to get to them," said Abu Bishoy. "And we don't know whose son this is, or whose daughter that is. Is this possible?"

A total of 15 children were killed in the fire, according to Copts United, a news website focusing on Christian news.

A list of victims obtained by The Associated Press said 20 bodies, including 10 children, were taken to the Imbaba public hospital. Three were siblings, twins aged 5 and a 3-year-old, it said. The church bishop, Abdul Masih Bakhit, was also among the dead at the hospital

Twenty-one bodies were taken to

other hospitals.

Mousa Ibrahim, a spokesman for the Coptic Orthodox Church, told the AP that 5-year-old triplets, their mother, grandmother and an aunt were among those killed.

Witness Emad Hanna said a church worker managed to get some children out of the church day care facilities. "We went upstairs and found

people dead. And we started to see from outside that the smoke was getting bigger, and people want to jump from the upper floor," Hanna said. "We found the children," some

dead, some alive, he added.

The country's health minister blamed the smoke and a stampede as people attempted to flee the fire for causing the fatalities. It was one of the worst fire tragedies in Egypt in recent years.

The church is located in a narrow street in one of the most densely populated neighborhoods in Cairo. Sunday is the first working day of the week, and traffic jams clog the streets in Imbama and surrounding areas in the morning. Some relatives criticized what

they said were delays in the arrival of ambulances and firefighters. "They came after people died. ... They came after the church burned down," shouted one woman standing outside the smoldering church. Health Minister Khaled Abdel-

Ghafar countered that the first ambulance arrived at the site two minutes after the fire was reported. Fifteen firefighting vehicles were

dispatched to the scene to put out the flames while ambulances ferried casualties to nearby hospitals, officials said. President Abdel Fattah el-Sis-

si spoke by phone with Coptic Christian Pope Tawadros II to offer his condolences, the president's office said. Sheikh Ahmed al-Tayeb, Al-Azhar's Grand Imam, also offered condolences to the head of the Coptic church.

"I am closely following the developments of the tragic accident," el-Sissi wrote on Facebook. "I directed

all concerned state agencies and institutions to take all necessary measures, and immediately to deal

with this accident and its effects."

Abdel-Ghafar, the health minister, said in a statement that two of the injured were discharged from a hospital while the others were still being treated.

The Interior Ministry said it ceived a report of the fire at 9 a.m. local time, and first responders found that the blaze had broken out in an air conditioner on the building's second floor.

The ministry, which oversees police and firefighters, blamed an electrical short-circuit for the fire, which produced huge amounts of smoke. Meanwhile, the country's chief prosecutor, Hamada el-Sawy, ordered an investigation and a team of prosecutors were dispatched to the church. He said most victims died of smoke inhalation.

By Sunday afternoon, emergency services said they managed to put out the blaze and the prime minister and other senior government officials arrived to inspect the site. Premier Mustafa Madbouly said surviving victims and families of the dead would receive payments as compensation and that the government would rebuild the church.

By late afternoon, caskets carrying the dead were transferred in ambulances for pre-burial prayers at two churches in the nearby Waraq neighborhood, as weeping women lined their path. Hundreds of mourners gathered at the churches for the funerals, before taking the bodies for burial in nearby cemeteries.

Egypt's Christians account for some 10% of the nation's more than 103 million people and have long complained of discrimination by the nation's Muslim majority.

Sunday's blaze was one of the worst fire tragedies in recent years in Egypt, where safety standards and fire regulations are poorly enforced. In March last year, a fire at a garment factory near Cairo killed at least 20 people and injured 24.
