# Dr. Sammy Sells retires

Editor's note: This is the first of two articles about two of Bedford County's long-time physicians retiring from private practice. See Saturday's edition for the second story. Today's story is about Dr. Samuel "Sammy" Sells. We thank him for his medical service to this community.

On Thanksgiving, Dr. Sammy Sells won't be on call, at least from the medical community.

Retiring this month, he's busy right now closing up his office at the Northside Professional building. As a bonus to his retirement, the new owners' buy out offer was just too good to refuse, he advised.

While his original idea was to sublet his office, the new owners had other designs on the new building, he said. "I couldn't see after almost 43 years, starting all over again, at a different location."

Still, by law, medical records have to be kept for 10 years. They will be transferred to another practice within the strictest and confidential way possible, Dr. Sells assures.

have also been in the same building with Dr. Sells, are reportedly moving to another office complex in Shelbyville. Dr. Sells' medical assistant, Kelly Cochrane, will be moving as well. Despite the vital use of computers in his office these days, there still has to be a paper trail with medical records. Though he doesn't have to keep older records, they have to go somewhere, he said. They must be in storage and accessible. They have to be kept in a secure location.

"There are just so many things we never envisioned . . . we would have to do," said Dr. Sells while sitting in his office, which is getting to be quite empty.

With all the red tape involved in keeping a physician's license, regulations, etc., he just believes it is time to close up shop. In time, he may do some consulting work, he shared.

There are some patients who have been with Dr. Sells for over 40 years. "I'm going to miss them," he said in his doctorly voice just recently from his office.

He sent a letter to his patients but he also called

### **Doctoring and** insurance

An annexation request for a large area between Midland Road and Highway 231 just north of Shelbyville came to a screeching halt Thursday night.

Developers Shelbyville City Council to forward their request on to the Planning Commission for further

No council member made the motion to pass on the request. Wallace Mayor Cartwright declared the motion failed after a period of silence.

The developers had proposed operating their own private

water and sewer system, which the council was told is done in cities as near as Murfreesboro. Some council members and representatives appeared almost offended at the request during a study session two weeks ago, pointing out that Shelbyville Power, Water, and Sewerage System has the capability to serve the area - and that, if built, funds otherwise available to the city would be lost.

Waleed Albakry, Director of Planning and Community Development, had said at the study session the developer's request was "premature."

# **TIF statement**

Council unanimously passed a resolution acknowledging "the Mayor and City Council's continuing effort to make the City of Shelbyville a desirable location economic development authorizing city staff to develop a TIF program for their consideration.

That resolution was placed on the agenda following a speciallycalled recent meeting in which Shane Hooper, President/CEO of Shelbyville/Bedford Partnership, city-county economic development agency, spoke to the council about the need for a TIF program.







# Midair crash occurs at Dallas air show

# Investigation involves WWII bomber

DALLAS (AP) national transportation official probing the cause of a midair crash of two historic military planes during an air show that left six people dead said Sunday that one of the key questions for investigators is why the aircraft were seemingly sharing the same space just before

A World War II-era bomber and a fighter plane collided and crashed to the ground in a ball of flames on Saturday, leav-

ing crumpled wreckage in a grassy area inside the Dallas Executive Airport perimeter, about 10 miles (16 kilometers) from the city's downtown. Several videos posted on social media showed the fighter plane flying into the bomber. "One of the things

we would probably most likely be trying to determine is why those aircraft were co-altitude in the same air space at the same time," Michael Graham, a member of the National Transportation Safety Board, said at a news conference.

The crash came three years after the crash of a bomber in Connecticut that killed seven, and amid ongoing concern about the safety of air shows involving older warplanes. The company that owned the planes flying in the Wings Over Dallas show has had other crashes in its more than 60-year history. The crash claimed

six lives, Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins tweeted Sunday, citing the county medical examiner. Authorities are continuing work to identify the victims, he said. Dallas FireRescue said there were no reports of injuries on the ground. Armin Mizani, the

mayor of Keller, Texas, said Terry Barker, a retired pilot who lived in Keller, was in the B-17 bomber that crashed. Mizani said he learned of Barker's death from his family.

Mizani said Barker's death has been difficult for his town of 50,000, where many of the residents know each other.

"It's definitely a big loss in our community," he said. "We're grieving."

# **Public safety**

# Who knew?

Only in the last few days have I learned that certain Tennessee state legislation was passed by the General Assembly and signed into law by the governor on April 22 of this year.

It is found in Public Chapter No. 959.

The law specifies that Tennessee's high school students be taught the virtues of capitalism and constitutional citizen representative self-governance. The law seems to require that students be taught that communism and socialism do not have those virtues.

"Students in grades nine

through twelve (9-12) must be taught about the virtues of capitalism and the constitutional republic form of government in the United States and Tennessee, as compared to other political and economic systems such as communism and socialism."

The new law explicitly attributes virtues, in this context meaning goodness, to capitalism and constitutional citizen representative self-governance. The semantics of the law seems to imply that communism and socialism are inferior systems and that our young people should be taught that fact.

I agree, and I definitely

do want our students to learn it.

This is not a trivial subject, and it is controversial. I know some Gen-Z folks who espouse socialism and even communism.

Is unregulated capitalism perfect? Of course not. Does our constitutional form of government always operate as it should? No. But they are the best economic and political systems in all of human history.

The fact that this is now a legal mandate is important. The Bedford County Department of Education has an obligation to operate in accordance with the

This matter seems to me worthy of in-service training for teachers, attention to monitoring and enforcement by supervisory personnel, public discussion by the school board, and news coverage.


The midterm elections placed economic and political philosophy in the limelight. The new law is timely and important.





# Education continues to provide a sizable return on investment

A recent report from the Center on Education and the Workforce at Georgetown University revealed just how valuable a college degree continues to be. As tuition costs at many colleges and universities rise and families wonder if investing in a college degree is as wise as it once was, the CEW report can reassure parents and their children that a college degree remains a valuable asset that pays significant financial dividends over the long haul.

According to the CEW report, adults with a bachelor's degree earn an average of \$2.8 million during their careers. By contrast, adults with a high school diploma earn an average of \$1.6 million over the course of their careers, while those without a diploma earn \$1.2 million in their lifetimes.

One key consideration for individuals concerns when education may not provide the expected financial return. Though people pursue advanced degrees for a variety of reasons, including the potential to earn more money over the course of their careers, the CEW study found that the average person with a master's degree earns \$3.2 million in their careers, or just \$400,000 more than

someone with a bachelor's degree. Though \$400,000 is a significant sum of money, given the cost to obtain a master's degree and the work required to earn it, some individuals, particularly those who would pursue such a degree solely to improve their earning potential, may not deem the investment worth their time or money. That's a consideration for people given the average cost of a master's degree, which the Education Data Initiative reports is slightly more than \$66,000. Field of study is another

consideration for individuals curious about the return

to expect when investing in education. The CEW report found that the median career earnings among individuals with a bachelor's degree in architecture and engineering is \$3.8 million, while individuals with a bachelor's in education earn slightly more than half that amount (\$2 million).

As the cost of higher education continues to rise, parents and students about to enter college should know that obtaining a college degree remains a worthy pathway to earning more money over the course of one's life.

# FOOD INFLATION

This article was put out by the UT Extension Consumer Economics Team. We've heard about the higher prices in the food chain, and here is a discussion of how it is affecting Thanksgiving. ( I may add some comment.)

Everyone knows that the cost of practically everything has increased. Since last year inflation has boosted overall prices 8.2 percent, but the cost of groceries has increased a whopping 13 percent, which University of Tennessee Extension says will impact this year's Thanksgiving Day meals. Many staple items, including butter, eggs and potatoes, have had steep price increases.

Andrew Griffith, asso-

ciate professor in the UTIA Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics, says despite an increased number of birds being placed, turkey production in 2022 is down 4.6 percent compared to 2021 year-to-date. Their average live weight is down, too. This has resulted in an increase in 8- to 16-pound whole hen prices. Whole hen prices exceeded \$1.72 per pound in September but while they are expected to decline prior to Thanksgiving, they are still likely to remain above \$1.50 per pound. Simply stated, turkey prices have followed other meat prices higher. (And to compound the issue, the Highly Pathic Avian Influenza disease has taken it toll on poultry, including turkey operations, reducing the supply for the season.)

To identify the total cost for a Thanksgiving meal for 10 people, UT Extension's Consumer Economics Leadership Team surveyed grocery stores across Tennessee from November 1 to November 7 to discover how much families could expect to spend on the holiday. This week was chosen to reflect some grocers running specials at certain items. Led by Ann Berry, a professor with UT Extension's Family and



# **Projects to improve forest health** and wildlife habitat announced

NASHVILLE – The Tennessee Department of Agriculture's Division of Forestry (TDF) and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA) have partnered with the Ruffed Grouse Society (RGS) to improve forest health and habitat for atrisk wildlife through forest restoration and management across the Cumberland Plateau. Visitors to Lone Mountain State Forest and Catoosa Wildlife Management Area will reap the benefits of healthy and thriving forests, enhanced wildlife viewing, and interpretive signage.

The partnership is led by RGS, which received a National Fish and Wildlife Foundation grant to implement Dynamic Forest Restoration Blocks to enhance shortleaf pine and oak forest habitat for ruffed grouse, golden-winged warblers, and other woodland and savanna-dependent species.

"Lone Mountain State Forest is a beloved location for locals and visitors to the Cumberland Plateau," Agriculture Commissioner Charlie Hatcher, D.V.M. said. "We are delighted that of the forest's 3,572 total acres, 383 acres will be included in this initiative. The Division of Forestry's State Forest Unit will work with RGS to plan and implement a variety of forest management activities. Additionally, the project will help us better understand and support the habitat functions of ruffed grouse and other wildlife species."

Lone Mountain State Forest and adjacent Catoosa Wildlife Management Area (WMA) are within the project area spanning Tennessee and Kentucky. Project partners will create, manage, and monitor areas known as dynamic forest restoration blocks to increase structural, age-class, and compositional diversity for healthy forests and abundant wildlife.

Blue flagging at Lone Mountain State Forest is evidence that inventory work is underway. During the course of this multiyear initiative, TDF's Prescribed Fire Strike Team will implement prescribed burning on some areas of the state forest and WMA to encourage native vegetation to grow and to reduce wildland fire risk. Commercial timber

harvests will also be conducted on some sites to diversify forest structure through thinning and regeneration treatments. Additional acreage will be improved through activities like controlling nonnative invasive species.

### **Forest Health and Wildlife Habitat Improvement Projects**

Visitors to the state forest and WMA can expect to find signs describing treatment methods and benefits. Field days are also being planned to demonstrate these practices for landowners who share similar objectives for their property. There will be little impact to existing state forest trails other than temporary closures while some activities, like prescribed burns and regeneration harvest operations, are implemented.

"Active forest management is a critical strategy for protecting and managing at-risk wildlife species," TWRA Executive Director Jason Maxedon said. "This project will demonstrate the power of partnerships in reversing the trend of unhealthy forest conditions on much of the plateau and increase opportunities for coordinated, science-based monitoring of forest and wildlife health."

RGS unites conservationists to improve wildlife habitat and forest health by promoting stewardship for forests and wildlife. The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation Cumberland Plateau Stewardship Fund restores native forests and freshwater habitats to conditions that will improve associated wildlife species and the health of freshwater systems while advancing strategies to support

TWRA manages more than 1.5 million acres of WMAs statewide for wildlife species and habitat management. Work on these areas is focused on conservation and the restoration of fish, wildlife, and plant resources for the benefit of all Tennesseans for generations to come. 
t was a chilly Saturday but the local Veterans Day Parade was held in all its glory on Saturday morning. Some entries had to pull out at the last minute, due to

# Three dead in University of Virginia shooting

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP)
— Three people have been killed and two others were wounded in a shooting at a parking garage at the University of Virginia, according to the school's president, and police searched Monday for a student who

was a suspect.

The shooting around 10:30 p.m. Sunday "resulted in three fatalities; two additional victims were injured and are receiving medical care," President Jim Ryan said in a letter to the university community posted on social media. He identified the suspect as Christopher Darnell Jones Ir.

The university's emergency management issued an alert on Sunday night notifying the campus community of an "active attacker firearm." The message warned students to shelter in place following a report of shots fired on Culbreth Road on the northern outskirts of campus. Classes were canceled Monday.

The UVA Police Department posted a notice online saying multiple police agencies including the state police were searching for a suspect who was considered "armed and dangerous."

In his letter to campus, the university president said Jones was suspected to have committed the shooting. The campus emergency management twitter account said that he was believed to be wearing blue jeans and a burgundy jacket and driving a black SUV with Virginia tags

The university's emergency management Twitter account said shortly before 7 a.m. that "a complete search on and around UVA Grounds" by law enforcement was underway and urged people on campus to remain sheltered.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives said agents were responding to the campus to assist in the investigation.

Ryan's letter confirmed that the suspect, who he said was a student, was still at large Monday morning.

"This is a message any leader hopes never to have to send, and I am devastated that this violence has visited the University of Virginia," Ryan wrote. "This is a traumatic incident for everyone in our community."

"So, I'm really looking more for growth from the time they start to the time they end. I don't expect the emotional side to be front and center," said Cook.



# Bills' catch vs. Vikings should have been overturned

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. — The Vikings beat the Bills in overtime. If not for an officiating mistake, they might have won in regulation.

The NFL's senior vice president of officiating acknowledged there was a breakdown in the instant replay process after a pivotal play late in Minnesota's 33-30 win over Buffalo

Gabe Davis' 20-yard reception along the sideline with 24 seconds left in regulation should have been reviewed before the Bills ran another play, Walt Anderson told a pool reporter after the game. The catch happened during Buffalo's five-play, 69-yard drive that ended with Tyler Bass hitting a 29-yard field goal to force overtime with 2 seconds left.

"Even though it happens fast and Buffalo hurries to the line of scrimmage for the next play, if the replay official can't confirm that it was a catch on that long of a completed pass, we should stop play to ensure it was a catch," Anderson said.

On replays, it appeared that Davis did not secure the ball while falling out of bounds.

"It would have been reversed to an incomplete pass because he did not maintain control of the ball after he hit the ground and the ball touched the ground out of bounds," Anderson

Vikings coach Kevin O'Connell said the catch happened in front of him on the sideline. He was unable to challenge the ruling because it occurred in the final 2 minutes, and said he did not get an explanation "I didn't think it was a catch,"

O'Connell said. "In that mode, that needs to be something they need to review from up top, or possibly New York. We didn't get any clarification on that. I did ask." Anderson said league officials will

review the video and audio from the game to determine why there wasn't "I'll have to find out from the replay official exactly what he didn't

Anderson said. O'Connell said there might have been another officiating error in overtime that could have affected the result. He questioned whether the Bills had 12 defenders on the field

feel like he saw to stop the game,"

when Minnesota running back Dalvin Cook was tackled for a 3-yard loss on first-and-goal from the Bills 2.

The Vikings kicked what turned out to be the winning field goal three plays later, but a touchdown on the opening drive of overtime would have ended the game without giving the Bills' offense a chance to respond.

Anderson credited replay officials for making the right decision on two key plays in the final minute of regulation.

# **Short World Cup** build-up poses challenges

Soccer's top players have followed a well-trodden path in the lead-up to previous World Cup tournaments.

Finish your club season. Take a break with friends and family. Join up with your national team. Spend two or three weeks familiarizing yourself with teammates, working on practice drills and playing a few warmup games before the big kickoff.

Not this time.

Adding to the novelty of this unique World Cup in Qatar the first in the Middle East, the first to be played in the middle of the traditional European soccer season — is the unusually truncated build-up to the tournament.

For some players, even less than that.

"We fly to Qatar on the 15th, arrive on the 16th, then we have five days to prepare for the first game," said Tony Strudwick, head of performance for Wales' national team. "It's a challenge how we bring that all together."

Strudwick has the crucial job of getting Wales' players in prime shape — physically, but also mentally — for the nation's first World Cup game in 64 years, which will be against the United States on Nov. 21.

On one hand, he is excited about welcoming players who are in what he describes as a "good rhythm" midway

On the other, he and the rest of Wales' backroom staff have no control over what shape the squad will arrive for the tournament. Some players have been playing virtually three games a week for the past two months; others might have been struggling for game time at their clubs.

"We can't phone up the clubs and say, 'We need X, Y and Z players to be playing these minutes," Strudwick told The Associated Press. "We can't dictate that, so we have to

be agile in our planning. "It's going to come right down to the last league game before the World Cup and we'll need contingency plans."

World Cup-bound players had to be freed from club duties from Monday. The first game of the tournament is between host Qatar and Ecuador on Sunday.

How a team prepares during those few days before group play begins largely depends on when its first game takes place, with the first set of matches spread over five days.

The squads of Brazil and Serbia have the longest preparation time, for example, given the countries meet in the last of the four games on Nov. 24.

Lars Lagerback has coached at three World Cups for two nations — with his native Sweden in 2002 and 2006 and with Nigeria in 2010 — and said his priority would be "rehab" in the few days the squad is together before its opening game. "You can't do much training," Lagerback told the AP

in a telephone interview. "I think it's going to benefit the national teams with coaches who have organized the team for a long time and where everybody knows how to play. "If you have been with a team for at least one or two

years, they have an idea and a philosophy of how they want to play. I don't think having a friendly match or not is really important." Some countries simply have no time for a friendly, with

FIFA saying teams must arrive in the host country at least five days before their first game and cannot organize a warmup match in that time. The countries starting later have a choice. While World

Cup champion France has no friendly planned before its opener against Australia on Nov. 22, Argentina — also in group action that day - is scheduled to play the United Arab Emirates in a warmup match on Wednesday. Spain has a friendly arranged against Jordan on Thursday, when Portugal has one against Nigeria. Wales is one of the teams who will not play a friendly

and Strudwick doesn't see that as a disadvantage.

"We can build fitness and match rhythm and tempo in in-house games, where we can control what players do," he said. "You can't have that control in a friendly. And if we were to put a friendly game in there, while only having a

week's preparation, it means you lose training days."

# McCarthy 4th-down call goes wrong

GREEN BAY, Wis. — In his first game back in Green Bay as Dallas' coach, Mike McCarthy didn't exactly leave Packers fans pining for the good

Instead, McCarthy made a crucial

decision that backfired, going for it on fourth-and-3 on the opening possession of overtime when he could have sent Brett Maher out to try a long, go-ahead field goal. The Cowboys were stopped,

McCarthy's former quarterback Aaron Rodgers led the Packers down the field, and Green Bay beat Dallas 31-28 on Sunday. "I'm fine with the decision," said

McCarthy, who was fired as Green Bay's coach in 2018. "Obviously, I know we didn't convert. Fourthand-3, we just didn't convert." McCarthy was more upset about

the penalties that led to that pivotal fourth down. He threw his headset to the turf in frustration after Dak Prescott was pressured by Jarran Reed and threw a desperation pass to Tony Pollard that fell incomplete.

Dallas' final offensive play capped a frustrating day for McCarthy in his return to the city that has a street near Lambeau Field named in his honor.

McCarthy coached the Packers to their most recent Super Bowl title after the 2010 season and went 125-77-2 with Green Bay from 2006-18.

This wasn't how he envisioned his

Cowboys (6-3) entered

Sunday with a 195-0 record, including

playoffs, when they led by at least 14 points heading into the fourth quarter. Now they're 195-1.

"I'm very frustrated with the end of the game, obviously," McCarthy said. "I think just the biggest thing for us is we need to just go out here and just learn from these games. I love these kind of games. That's what I told these (guys), 'You need these tight games to get to where you want "I thought we were in total

control and then in overtime the penalties and things were very, very, very frustrating. But you've got to overcome those things. The Packers (4-6) rallied to tie

McCarthy also had a much longer conversation earlier in the day. "That was really, really meaningful I think for both of us," Rodgers said.

McCarthy got emotional in the

days leading up to the game as he spoke at length about what his years in Green Bay meant to him. But after the loss, McCarthy wasn't in much of a mood to talk about what his return meant personally.

"I'm not trying to be rude, (but) I'm humble pied out," McCarthy said.

# Marlins make history, name O'Connor president

MIAMI (AP) — Caroline O'Connor didn't know what her ceiling was when she entered the sports business world, simply because there were so few examples of women who traveled her path.

Turns out, she had no limit.

The Miami Marlins promoted O'Connor to president of business operations on Monday, making them the first U.S. major sports franchise to have women serving simultaneously as president and general manager. The Marlins made history by hiring Kim Ng as GM in November 2020; two years later, they've made another significant move.

"When I talk to young girls, I really like them to see me in my role because I didn't feel like I had that role model," O'Connor said. "And I want people to see themselves when they see me and know that it is a possibility."

O'Connor is just the second

woman to serve as president of a Major League Baseball team; Seattle's Catie Griggs is the other. She was brought to the Marlins by then-CEO Derek Jeter in 2017 as a senior vice president and chief of staff, then became the team's chief operating officer in 2019.

Ng handles the on-field business, O'Connor runs the offfield business.

"We are fortunate to have someone with Caroline's business acumen and vision leading our day-to-day business operations," Marlins chairman and principal owner Bruce Sherman said. "Her passion and drive for success is unmatched in our game and the South Florida market. Her leadership will continue to guide the Marlins organization toward our goal of sustained success while strategizing additional new ventures to grow our business and enhance our brand recognition."

O'Connor's path to this spot was, in some ways, unintentional. She was a high school athlete in New Jersey — playing basketball, tennis, soccer and softball and went to college at Rutgers and New York University, first studying computers, then finance.

She worked for some powerful places: IBM, UBS Investment Bank, Morgan Stanley. She wasn't thinking about a career in sports.

And then Jeter called.

"A once-in-a-lifetime portunity," O'Connor said. She's been with the Marlins

Miami has been trying to turn things around, on the field and off, for the better part of the last two decades. Jeter was part of the ownership group that took over in 2017; he's gone, but two of his more significant hires - Ng and

O'Connor — are now tasked with

finishing the job. O'Connor has seen progress. Attendance this past season was up 12% over 2019, the last time there was a full season of baseball without pandemic interruptions

or major restrictions — though

there is still a long way to go before Miami gets the crowds it is seeking.

O'Connor has overseen growth in season-ticket sales. With the 2023 World Baseball Classic coming to Miami for all three rounds in March, including the championship game, the Marlins know big crowds are coming. O'Connor is fixated on how to get those people to come back as Marlins customers.

"I think it's a really special place," she said. "And I would say if we didn't feel so strongly about this market and the opportunity that is here, that would not make us so excited to come in every day. I think we have so many people in this market that love entertainment, love sports, love baseball, love getting together and going out. It's just trying to create an experience that attracts everyone."

The growing role of women in baseball leadership isn't lost O'Connor. Griggs leads

the Mariners; Laura Day is executive vice Minnesota's president and chief business officer; Kellie Fischer has a similar role in Texas, as the Rangers' EVP and chief financial officer.

"I've been incredibly fortunate in that I've had a lot of support from a lot of different people, regardless of gender, my entire career," Griggs said earlier this year on a panel at Seattle University. "With that being said, I haven't been able to see a lot of people who look like me doing the stuff that I do. ... I don't have a lot of role models"

O'Connor feels the same way. She doesn't mind the "trailblazer" description. She just goes about all the details of her job — including sitting down with community groups and civic organizations, even having lunch last month with the Consul General of Japan at his Miami residence - knowing that her success now might make it easier for women to follow.

"I'm expecting to get more state qualifiers this year than we have before," he said. "This is the most experienced team we've ever had,


and everyone is learning and excited. It's been fantastic having the older guys help the younger guys understand everything.' It isn't an easy road to glory for the Champions as

# **Former host** Russia barred from World Cup

Four years after Vladimir Putin hosted the World Cup party, Russia is off the guest

While the soccer world focuses on the opening game of the World Cup in Qatar on Sunday, Russia will be playing a friendly game in Uzbekistan.

Russia was kicked out of World Cup qualifying after it invaded Ukraine and now can only play friendlies against the few nations prepared to accept its invitations.

The Russian men's national team's only game of 2022 so far was a 2-1 win over Kyrgyzstan in September. Russian clubs are barred from the Champions League and the women's national team was removed from the European Championship.

Monday marked one year

since the last competitive game of the Russian men's national team, a 1-0 loss at Croatia on a swampy, waterlogged field. That meant Russia didn't qualify for the World Cup directly and went into the playoffs. By the time those came around, Russia had invaded Ukraine.

Russia's

opponent, Poland, refused to travel to Moscow to play, as did the other teams in the playoff bracket. That raised the prospect of Russia qualifying for the World Cup by default. In legal battles at the Court of Arbitration for Sport, FIFA argued that letting Russia compete could cause more boycotts and "irreparable and chaotic"

damage to its tournament.

Games against Iran and Bosnia-Herzegovina were planned for November but neither is taking place. Instead, Russia is touring two former Soviet nations to play Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

The planned Iran game would have given Russia the credibility of facing a team which has qualified for the World Cup. Ukraine accuses Russia of using Iranian drones to attack its cities, something Russia denies. Ukraine asked FIFA to remove Iran from the tournament, though FIFA has not done so.

The president of the Russian soccer federation told local media that the game with Iran could be held in Qatar shortly before the World Cup. That could have been seen as a snub to FIFA. No date or venue was ever confirmed before Russia announced Tajikistan and Uzbekistan games instead. Putin endorsed plans for

a friendly against Bosnia-Herzegovina in September, saying that "sport should unite, not divide, people." That game was postponed indefinitely by the Bosnian soccer federation last month, after team captain Edin Džeko and the national players' union opposed the game and expressed support

Russia still has friends in the World Cup host nation. Qatar's emir thanked Russia in October for its "great support" for organizing the World Cup when he met Putin for talks at a summit in

for Ukraine.

# Watson cleared to practice as suspension nears end

CLEVELAND — Cleveland Browns quarterback Deshaun Watson was cleared to practice Monday, a significant step in his return to the NFL following an 11-game suspension.

Watson, who was accused of sexual misconduct by more than two dozen women during massage therapy sessions, reached a settlement with the league in August to sit out 11 games, pay a \$5 million fine and undergo counseling and treatment.

To this point, Watson has been permitted only to attend meetings and work out at the team's facility. The Browns (3-6) don't practice until Wednesday, when Watson will rejoin his teammates on the field.

As long as he continues to meet conditions of the agreement, Watson will make his debut for the Browns on Dec. 4 against Houston, which drafted him in 2017 and traded him to Cleveland in March.

Browns general manager Andrew

Berry recently said Watson will play against the Texans. The three-time Pro Bowler will need some time to ramp up to game speed after sitting out the entire 2021 season while demanding a trade.

Watson insists he did not harass any of the women, who accused him of lewd behavior during the massage sessions while he played for Houston. He settled 23 of 24 civil lawsuits filed against him in Texas.

Two grand juries declined to indict him on criminal charges.

# Browns in panic mode after loss

popped popcorn In heavy saucepan, combine sugar, cranberry sauce, orange peel, cranberry juice, corn syrup, vinegar and salt.

Bring to boil; lower heat and cook to 250 F on candy thermometer.

Mixture will bubble in pan; watch to

keep from boiling over. Pour slowly onto hot popcorn and mix until well-coated.

Let stand 5 minutes, or until mixture can easily be formed into balls. Butter hands and form into 3-inch balls.
