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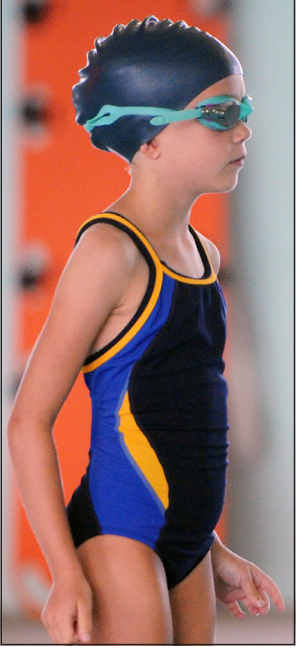

## City Council gets first look at Duck River project

A PowerPoint featuring three possible plans for the Duck River overlook was presented to the Shelbyville City Council during the study session Thursday night for the July regular meeting.

Neel-Schaffer, Inc., of Nashville; specializing in engineering, planning and construction management, sent several representatives to the meeting to discuss three possible options. Also working with the concepts is Studio 8 Designs in Nashville.

One was inspired by the pencil industry back in the day when Shelbyville was known as "The Pencil City".

## Chick-fil-A set for Shelbyville

Chick-fil-A is on the way! It may have been the worst kept secret in the history of Bedford County. A building on North Main Street is being demolished. From the time the destruction began social media was abuzz with speculation the space would be filled by a Chick-fil-A.

At Friday morning's meeting of the Joint Economic Development Board, Chick-fil-A was a major part of the discussion. Friday afternoon the developers gave permission to officially report the new Chick-fil-A will soon be under construction.



Shelbyville Mayor Randy Carroll pointed out the city paid the developer \$300,000 through its industrial development board as an incentive for the project.

"Chick-fil-A is moving dirt," Carroll said. "We're ready for some chicken here."

"The developer requested the \$300,000 and the council approved it. We have worked with Shane Hooper (president-CEO of the Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership) in getting Chick-fil-A to come to Shelbyville. It cost money to bring

things like this to Shelbyville."

Projects like these are important as a source of tax revenue for this city and county.

"Furthermore, some residents will see the Chick-fil-A brand as an addition to their quality of life," Hooper said.

Hooper stresses the addition of Chick-fil-A is going to mean Shelbyville and Bedford County will be more attractive to retailers and other casual dining establishments.

"Chick-fil-A is a major stepping-stone towards recruiting more retail options," Hooper said. "And it also attracts more sales opportunities for our existing retailers."

"For many people Chick-fil-A is a destination. When they patronize Chick-fil-A as a destination, they typically buy other goods and services while in Shelbyville and Bedford County. That's good for existing businesses and for municipal revenue."

Hooper stressed that there is still work to do in terms of attracting casual dining where customers can walk in and place an order and eat at a table.

"We don't have our fair share of casual dining," Hooper said. "We still have some work to do there. We are working with developers on finding locations."

## Commission passes budget, \$2.32 tax rate

The Bedford County Board of Commissioners passed the fiscal year 2023-24 budget and the \$2.32 property tax rate Thursday but not without a few objections.

The \$2.32 rate was set last year, increasing the previous rate of \$1.97. But some commissioners would have liked to see that rate go down to \$2.17.

A motion was set by Commissioner Eric Maddox for the decrease; the motion failed with 4 ayes and 14 nays.

"Those 15 pennies could have been cut and the county could still run efficiently," Maddox told the T-G.

During the meeting, Maddox said, "I know that it takes money to operate county business. It's not free and neither are the services, but based on our revenue sources, it should be affordable to all...There are things listed in this budget that are nice to have...We've got a fire marshal. Do we really need it? There's \$100,000 for the Shelbyville Partnership Economic Development fund. Do we really need it? Do we really need people making six figures on our county payroll...Some of you people feel these things are needed, but I've got people in my district that don't

even have clean drinking water."

After Maddox's motion failed, the \$2.32 rate passed unanimously.

Commissioner Linda Yockey, who made the motion to pass the current tax rate, said, "This budget is not perfect, but there are a lot of things in there. Things that will keep us going so that we don't make mistakes that we've made in the past, such as the raises for the employees so that we don't get in the fix that we were in last year."

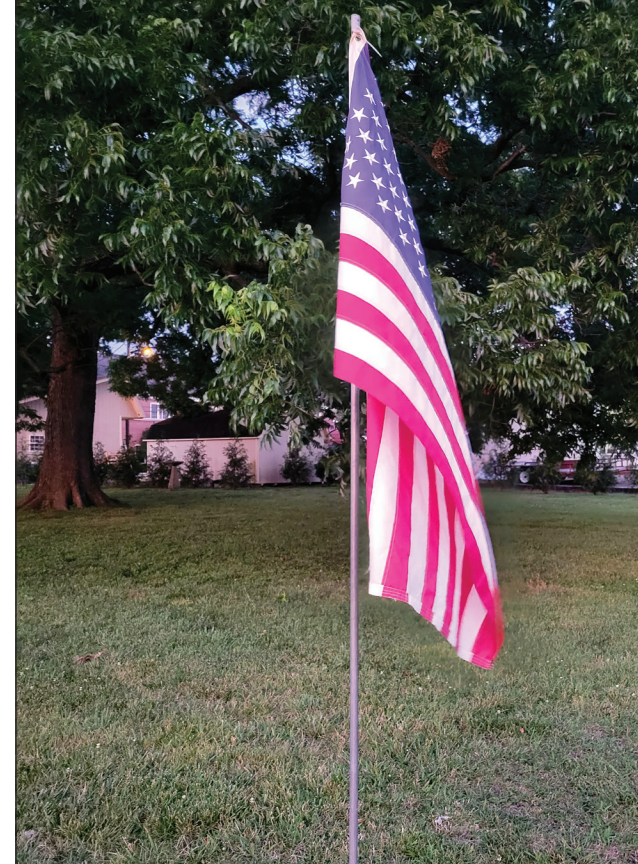
Yockey emphasized the budget's allowance for a new juvenile center, SROs in schools, and the expansion of The Liberty School, which will all go toward bettering the education system in Bedford County.

A motion was also made by Commissioner Bill Anderson to unbundle the categories of budget expenditures. This would allow for each category to be individually voted on, invoking a conflict of interest, which would decrease the number of votes needed.

Some commissioners, like Commissioner Drew Hooker, were in favor of this, "I think it's extremely important that we unbundle these..."

because there are individual things that we have the ability to talk to and talk directly about when we unbundle it...If we don't do that, then what we're saying is that each individual line item is really not important as long as the tax rate doesn't adjust."

Others, like Commissioner Greg Vick, disagreed, saying, "We have worked on this budget; it is not a month-long project, it's not a two-week project. A budget doesn't start on day one, it continues on through the year. Those of us who attend the budget hearings understand where the items go...We debate, and we continually question at all of our budget

meetings how we arrive at this number...Since February we've worked on this..."

He continued, "This is nothing more than finding a way to line-item veto things in our budget and it's not necessary and we can't do it. We are prohibited from having a line-item veto."

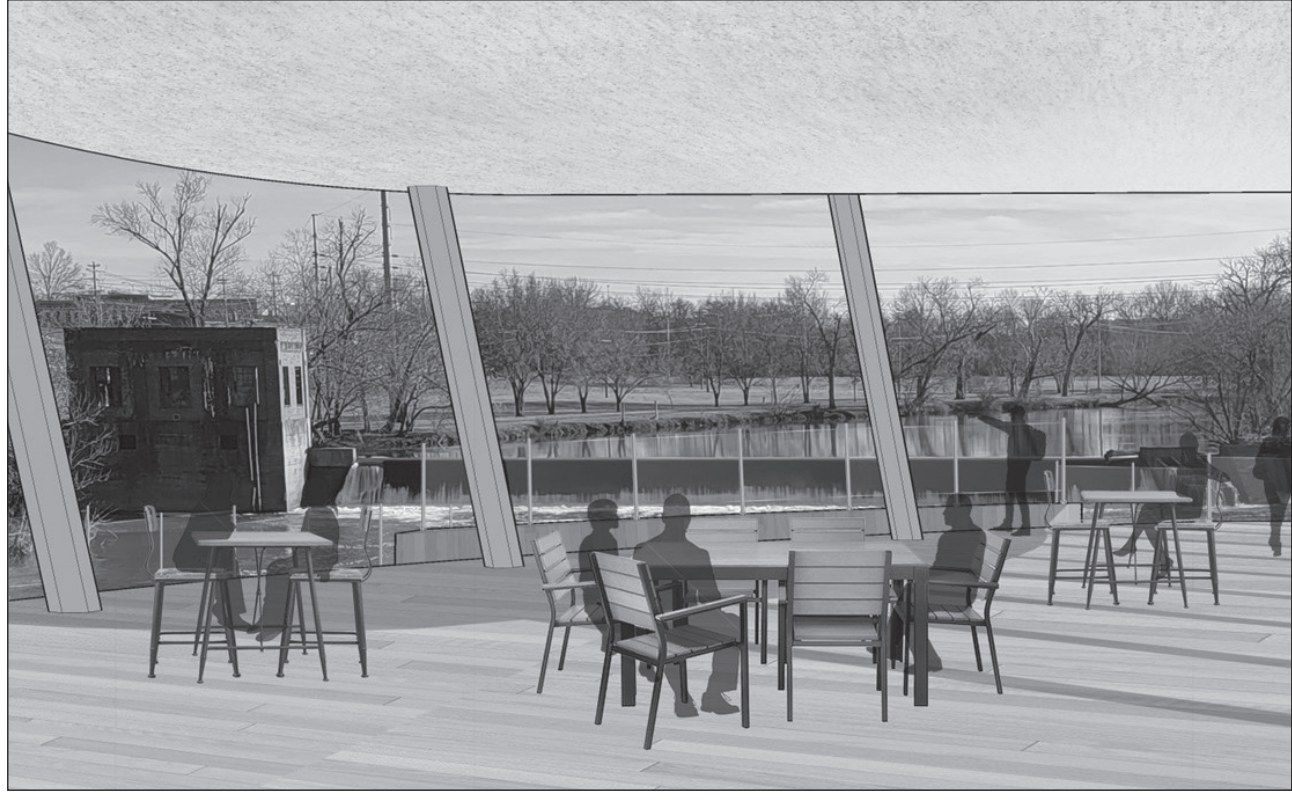
The motion to unbundle failed 8 to 10.

The final revenue stream for each fund category under the \$2.32 property rate goes as follows:

- General - \$1.43
- Highway/Public Works - \$0.09
- General Purpose School - \$0.62
- General Debt Service - \$0.15
- County capital Projects - \$0.0352



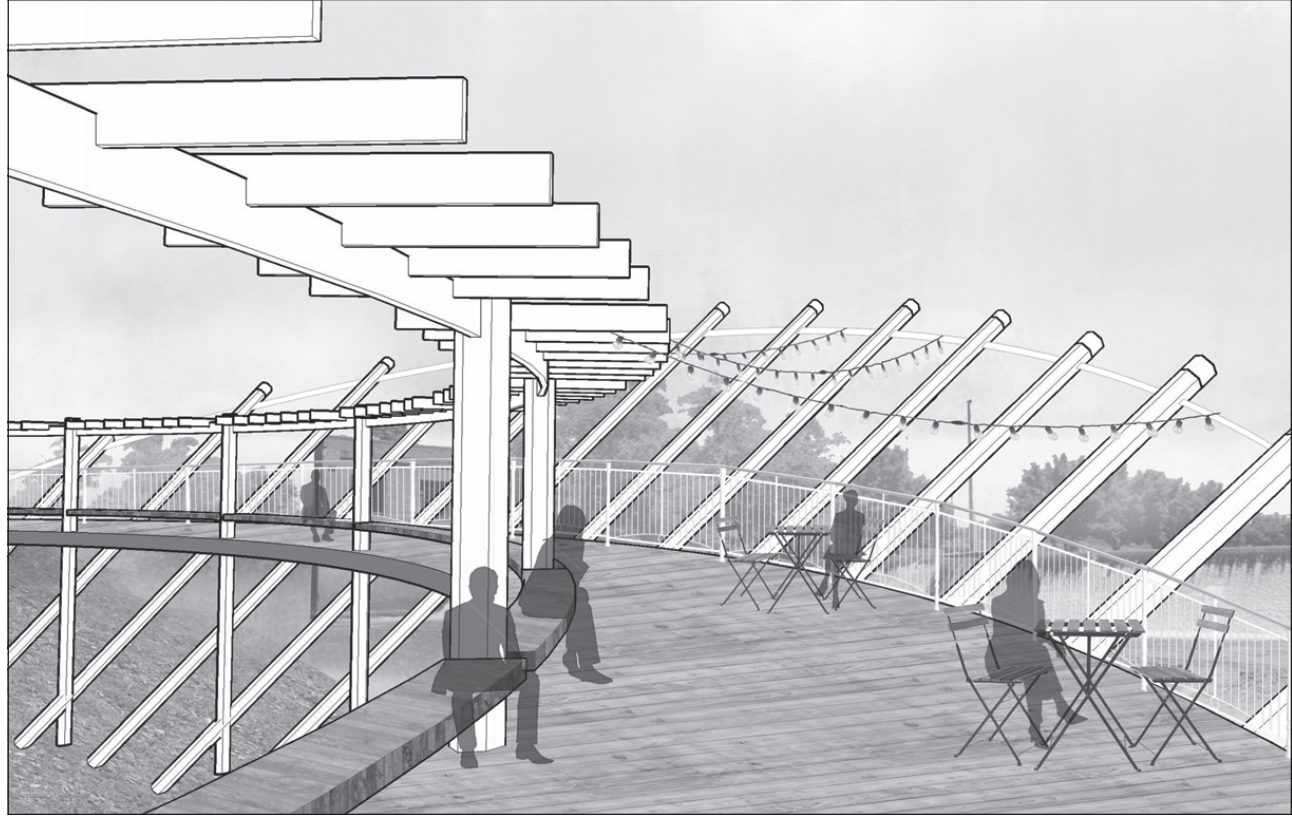
The modern concept was one of three presented by Neel-Schaffer, Inc. and Studio 8 Design at the July study session of the Shelbyville City Council.

The design use erasers, designed to change colors, to support the fencing.

The Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration, a key part of Shelbyville and Bedford County, was featured in a design which incorporated the Tennessee Walking Horse silhouette, an overlook designed like the “big oval” in the show-ring and accents copying the main entrance gates to

the show grounds.

Rounding out the presentation was a futuristic concept designed to enhance the views of both the dam and the historic courthouse dome.

Some of the parameters the designers were working with on the concepts were:

\*Room for approximately 50 occupants, standing or sitting.

\*An open concept with the option of adding a roof later.

\*Needed designs to relate to the public square and the courthouse.

\*Located close to the dam in order to cut down on noise from highway traffic and provide better views of the river.

\*The design should tell the history and the story of the Duck River and the town.

\*Local elements and character should be incorporated into the design.

\*A design that will attract passer-by tourists and encourage them to visit.

Shelbyville Mayor Randy Carroll and City Manager Scott Collins presented the designs Friday

morning to the Joint Economic Development Board.

All three of the concepts presented included these requirements. It was stressed these are preliminary designs to prompt feedback from the council and the public.

A public viewing of the designs will be held Monday, July 10, at 5 p.m. at the old city council meeting room at the Shelbyville Police Department building. The public is invited to attend and provide feedback on the designs.

**Tech's Rural Reimagined helps reduce distressed counties**

COOKEVILLE — Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced this week that the number of distressed counties in the state has reduced to eight, the fewest in Tennessee history - a feat that was made possible in part through the collaboration and support of Tennessee Tech University's Rural Reimagined initiative. Distressed counties rank among the 10 percent most economically distressed counties in the nation. Tech launched its Rural Reimagined initiative in 2019 to leverage the full resources of the university to support the flourishing of Tennessee's rural communities. Today, Rural Reimagined is on the ground in 65 of Tennessee's rural counties, actively engaged in nine ongoing local tourism projects, and has helped 200 small businesses in the last year alone, always at no cost to them. Meanwhile,

Tech students involved with Rural Reimagined have logged a collective 113,000 hours of volunteer service since the initiative began. Rural Reimagined has actively helped seven distressed counties with plans in place to assist each of the state's remaining distressed counties during the course of fiscal year 2024. The impact of Rural Reimagined is especially pronounced in the Upper Cumberland region that surrounds Tech's campus where, since fiscal year 2019, Fentress, Jackson and Morgan counties have been moved off the distressed counties list and DeKalb, Overton and White counties have improved from "at-risk" to "transitional" counties. Tennessee's recently enacted Fiscal Year 2024 budget allocated \$1 million for Rural Reimagined, a nod to its role as an invaluable partner in

spurring new ideas and investment in the state's most disadvantaged communities. "Tennessee Tech students and faculty believe in our state and want to do their part to ensure its continued success," said Michael Aikens, Ph.D., director of the Center for Rural Innovation at Tech and administrative chair of Rural Reimagined. "We launched Rural Reimagined because we know that Tennessee thrives when every community is afforded opportunities to rise. Our rural counties and towns are rich in talent, opportunity and scenic beauty that deserve to be explored. Rural Reimagined comes alongside these communities and their local businesses with our free services and support to help them put their best foot forward. From tourism branding and marketing campaigns, to research

funding, computer literacy and grant support, Rural Reimagined is deeply planted in these communities and committed to their success. We count it a privilege to partner with Governor Lee's administration and lawmakers on both sides of the aisle to deliver better outcomes for rural Tennessee." Tennessee Tech President Phil Oldham and State Senator Paul Bailey wrote about the work of Rural Reimagined in a recent op-ed for The Tennessean, explaining "Rural Reimagined has plans to expand its reach into all remaining rural counties in the state and to partner with more small businesses in distressed and at-risk counties that need its free services. In each project it takes on, Rural Reimagined offers the talents of one of our state's greatest exports: Tennessee Tech students.

**Tennessee teachers looking for higher pay, mentoring, training opportunities**

The Center Square - Tennessee teachers are looking for higher pay and benefits, more mentorship and development opportunities and more support from leadership, according to feedback from teachers across the state to the Department of Education. The department received 1,000 responses to a November request for teachers to give feedback on a statewide listening tour. The department then pulled a representative group of 100 teachers to provide feedback in 10 cohorts. The group included representation from each CORE region, grade level, district, and school type along with a range of years of experience.

regarding policy changes and also said teacher recognition can have a large impact. The department cited a new law, set to go into effect July 1, that will incrementally raise the minimum teacher pay in the state from \$40,000 to \$50,000 for the 2026-27 school year by bumping the minimum to \$42,000 in the fall, \$44,500 the next year and continuing to rise. A fiscal note on the bill said it would require \$125 million of the Tennessee Investment in Student Achievement funding formula to be restricted for the pay increase starting next fiscal year and would result in a \$1.6 million increase in combined local expenses starting in financial 2026-27. Another portion of that bill, which removes the option of automatic withdrawal of professional association dues from paychecks is being challenged in court by the Tennessee Education Association. The TEA claimed the law violates a single-subject requirement for bills, the details weren't included in the bill's caption and doesn't disclose the bill repeals the Professional Educators Collaborative Conferencing Act, the state's negotiation law.

**No standardized test scores required**

Lynchburg - While standardized tests (ACT/SAT) are typically required for admission to college, Motlow students are not required to take standardized tests for college admission. Students should have applied to Motlow but do not have to wait for their acceptance letter to take the ACCUPLACER assessment. Potential dual enrollment students also have the option of taking the ACCUPLACER, depending on what their high school's policy is. To learn more about dual enrollment guidelines, students should contact their high school dual enrollment representative or Motlow's dual enrollment coordinators listed at <https://www.motlow.edu/students/high-school/dual-enrollment/contacts.html>. According to Educational Support Services Director Dr. Desiree Vannatta, Motlow is an open-enrollment

college. She states, "We use test scores for placement into appropriate classes to meet students' needs. Motlow does not use test scores for enrollment. Your scores on the ACCUPLACER are not in lieu of the ACT but rather a placement test to help students be placed in courses in which their ACT testing was not successful as desired or needed." While Motlow also accepts ACT and SAT scores and offers the ACT on-ground for the convenience of prospective students, the ACCUPLACER customizes questions for each individual to accurately assess a learner's current skillset. The ACCUPLACER is administered online and is scored immediately so that Motlow's Academic Advisors are able to quickly advise new learners. Dr. Vannatta adds, "In approximately an hour, students can find the courses that they are eligible to take

as opposed to courses that may be selected for them in which students may find themselves more advanced." There are free practice tools available for the ACCUPLACER at <https://studentportal.accuplacer.org/#/home>. Taking a practice assessment can help students understand what to expect and reduce assessment anxiety. Dr. Vannatta tells those considering the assessment, "Do not look at it as a measurement of whether you can go to college. The ACCUPLACER is a tool to help you choose the right courses so you can succeed in college." 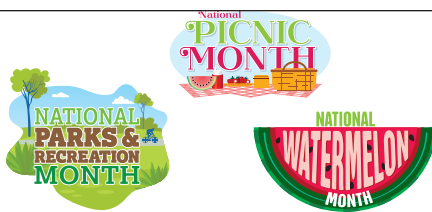
## PANTRY CLEANING

## TEA KETTLE BUILDUP

**Dear Heloise:** I love to make a nice warm cup of tea, even in the summertime. **New laws in effect July 1**

The start of a new month means a lot to some people. For Tennessee's state government, July 1 means new laws take effect, such as:

**School Expulsion for Mass Threats**

Any student who brings a gun to school, assaults a teacher(s), threatens mass violence at a school, or brings drugs on campus, could face a one-year expulsion. Schools have discretionary overrule on a case-by-case basis and could intervene should it warrant a second look.

**Gender-Affirmed Care for Transgender Youth(s)**

For minors who are requiring gender-affirming care, the new law bans puberty blockers and hormone therapy. The law, however, does not block surgeries or drug prescriptions for those seeking to change their gender. Unfortunately, those who have been under the care of a physician prior to July 1 will lose access to that care after March 31st, 2024. Those who choose to receive care after July 1 will be unable to start receiving treatments within the Volunteer State.

**Death Penalty Sped Up**

The days of getting to spend months or years on Death Row, while awaiting appeals will soon be over. The new law will require those people sentenced to death to be executed within 30 business days after an appeal and the courts have "exhausted all available methods of post-conviction relief". Additionally, the new law provides for juries to decide whether the convicted person's death sentence be expedited. It would take a unanimous vote of the jury on whether or not to speed up the process and it only applies to those convicted of first-degree murder.

**Move Over Law**

The Move Over Law not only applies to Police, Fire, EMS, and Tow Operators, but it will now affect you if you do not slow down and/or move over for vehicles with their

hazard lights activated. Fines for these infractions can cost you anywhere from \$250 to \$500 for the first offense, jail time, and up to \$2500 in additional violations.

**Delta-8 Law**

Beginning in a few days, a new law aimed at regulating Delta-8 products, including gummies, cartridges and other products, will make the legal buying age of 21 years old mandatory. The products must also be sold in child-proof packaging and not exhibit child-like images.

**Silas Gable Flatt Law**

This new law goes into effect and makes it an offense for someone knowingly providing a motor vehicle to anyone under the influence of any intoxicant or whose driving privileges have been suspended or revoked. Violations of this law will earn you a Class A Misdemeanor and a minimum of 48 hours in your local jail. A second offense will grant you a 72-hour stay and a third offense will give you a one-week vacation courtesy of your local law enforcement agency.

**Drug Prosecution Immunity**

As controversial as this may be, the new law taking effect July 1st, will provide immunity from arrest and prosecution for anyone experiencing an overdose for their first or any subsequent overdoses. The discretion has been given to local law enforcement or the district attorney's office on whether or not they wish to pursue charges.

**Telephone Solicitation Penalties**

This new law aims at penalizing companies who constantly call you at all hours of the day wanting to sell you something. In addition to phone call solicitations, text messages may not be made between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m. and they cannot use any other methods of circumventing the subscribers' use of caller ID. Additionally, they cannot contact anyone on the Do Not Call Registry. They must pay \$500 yearly to defray any regulatory and enforcement expenses and a solicitor who

violates these regulations is subject to a civil penalty of \$2,000 per violation. Previous laws only applied to telephone calls during those hours.

**Enhanced Sentencing Guidelines**

Also taking effect July 1st is a new law that requires anyone convicted of aggravated kidnapping, aggravated rape, or rap to be sentenced to a Range II offense. In the Volunteer State, a Range II offense for aggravated rape or aggravated kidnapping brings a 25-40-year imprisonment and a Class A Felony. A Range II sentence for rape is a Class B Felony and imprisonment between 12-20 years.

**Electronic Monitoring of Work Release Inmates**

Although not taking effect July 1, this new law will begin January 1, 2024, and aims at requiring electronic monitoring of any inmates who have been granted Work Release privileges. This incorporates any inmates who are released from custody and allowed to leave the confines of the jail in order to perform paid or unpaid work. They must use an electronic monitoring device at all times and require the employer or person utilizing the inmate, to pay for the costs incurred while monitoring the inmate.

**New DUI Law**

The new Senate Bill 328 and House Bill 144 will now reduce the number of days a person convicted of a second offense DUI, from 25 days to 17 days before being eligible to participate in a substance abuse program. The new bill also requires judges to impose a transdermal alcohol monitoring device for a 90-day period on all persons charged or convicted of three or more DUI-related offenses. The person must maintain sobriety for the 90-day period upon release from jail on probation or bail (unless the person's criminal case terminates prior to the completion period).

**\$412M tax cut headlines Tennessee bills that become law July 1**

The Center Square – Many of the laws passed during the recent Tennessee Legislative session will go into place July 1, the beginning of the new fiscal year, including a \$412 million tax cut.

That cut includes \$272.8 million toward a three-month grocery tax holiday between Aug. 1 and Oct. 31 along with changing the state franchise and excise business taxes to single sales factor taxes like 32 other states.

The law also creates a two-year pilot for a family-leave tax credit that will be created for businesses that give employees from two to 12 weeks of paid leave, providing at least 50% of normal wages over that period.

"These bold tax cuts will provide more growth opportunities for businesses and financial relief for families on everyday expenses," said

Senate Majority Leader Jack Johnson, R-Franklin. "Tennessee is one of the lowest taxed states in the nation, and this move to further cut taxes strengthens our dedication to being a pro-business and pro-family state."

Another bill puts \$194 million worth of school safety grants in place along with a requirement that schools keep doors locked at all times while students are present and requires school safety plans to be in place.

A few of the July 1 laws are also being challenged in court, including a teacher minimum pay increase that goes along with an end to the teacher option for automatic withdrawal of professional dues such as those for the Tennessee Education Association.

"These pay raises will help recruit and retain talented teachers and mitigate

teacher shortages. I look forward to continuing our work to support Tennessee teachers," said Sen. Bill Powers, R-Clarksville, who sponsored the bill.

The TEA sued to block that portion of the bill, saying it violates a single-subject requirement for bills, the details weren't included in the bill's caption, and doesn't disclose the bill repeals the Professional Educators Collaborative Conferencing Act, the state's negotiation law.

Another bill being challenged in court changes the makeup of the Metropolitan Nashville Airport Authority board. The Federal Aviation Administration says it will continue to recognize the current board, not a new one, while Metro Nashville's lawsuit on the matter is pending.

July 1 also will begin a new tax structure

for Tennessee's mobile sportsbooks, becoming the first state to tax sports gam-

bling based on gross wagers at 1.85% of all bets.

In May, the new law

would have cut the state's taxes collected from \$7.1 million to \$5.2 million.

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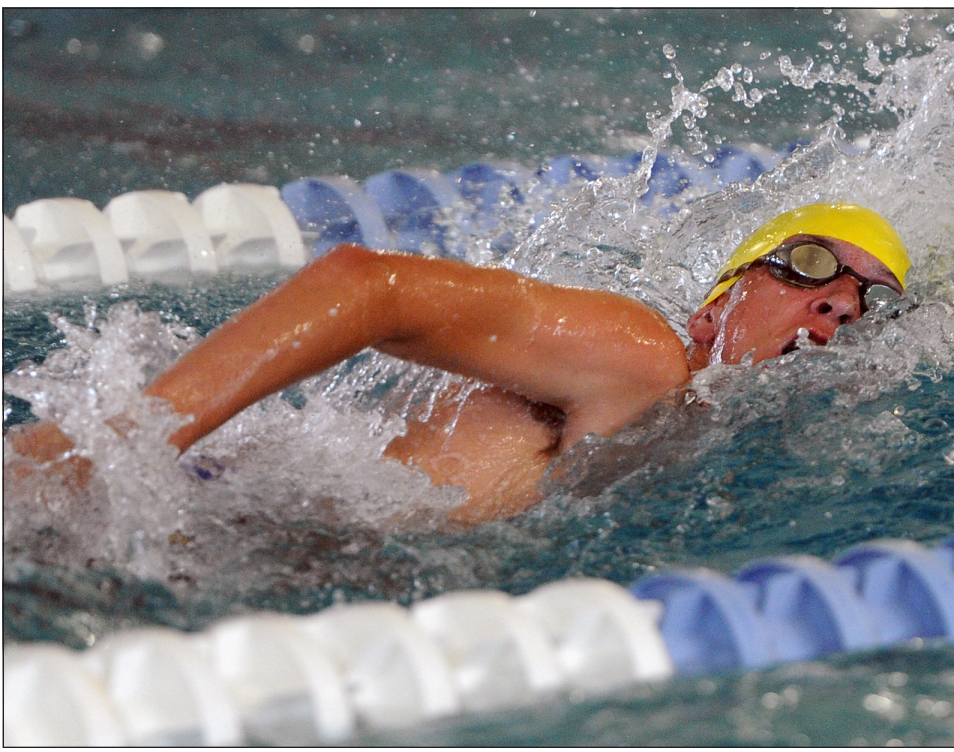

It was David Poile's draft, but on July 1 it became Barry Trotz's team.

Poile, general manager for the Nashville Predators since the franchise was announced 26 years ago, officially retired June 30. The GM, with 50 years and the most victories in the history of the NHL, will soon join his late father, Bud Poile, as a member of the Hockey Hall of Fame.

Trotz, the first coach in Predators history, becomes only the second general manager. He worked in conjunction with Poile in deciding who the Predators would select last week in the NHL Draft held here at Bridgestone Arena.

It was a case of out with the old and in with the new. The Predators added 11 players during the draft led by center Matthew Woods, the youngest player in NCAA Division I with the University of Connecticut last season where he led the team in scoring. He was the first selection at No. 15. They used the second of two first round picks on defenseman Tanner Molendyk from the Saskatoon Blades of the Western Hockey League at No. 24.

Then it was time to move two veteran players and add three new ones.

**Busy first day**

Saturday, the first official day for Trotz as general manager, was also the first day teams could sign free agents.

Prior to the free agency whirlwind, Trotz made two moves. He sent center Ryan Johansen to the Colorado Avalanche. The Predators will pay half of Johansen's \$8 million contract for the next two years as part of the deal.

Friday, with Trotz still one day away from taking over, he bought out the contract of center Matt Duchene who had three years remaining at \$8 million per year. The buyout amount was \$9,333,333. But the Predators will have a cap hit of \$2.56 million this season, \$5.56 million the next season and \$6.56 in the final year of the original contract. Then the

Predators will have a cap hit of \$1.5 million for three more years beyond the original contract. Duchene was snapped up by the Dallas Stars, a member of the Central Division with the Predators, for \$3 million for one year.

Both had been solid players for the Predators but with the exception of Duchene two seasons ago, neither one had played like an \$8 million man.

"The harsh reality is we moved two very good players," Trotz said. "Both of them have been high contributors to the Peds organization, not only on the ice, but off the ice."

Trotz was a major player on the first day of free agency adding forward Ryan O'Reilly, who split last season between the St. Louis Blues and the Toronto Maple Leafs; defenseman Luke Schenn, also from the Maple Leafs; and winger Gustav Nyquist, who split last season with the Columbus Blue Jackets and Minnesota Wild.

In another move the Predators resigned forward Cody Glass, a restricted free agent, for two-years at \$5 million.

**O'Reilly Factor**

O'Reilly signed a four-year deal for a total of \$18 million. With St. Louis in 2019 he was a Stanley Cup champion and winner of the Conn Smyth Award.

"Ryan O'Reilly is a serial winner," Trotz said. "He has been an MVP in the playoffs. He is the first guy at the rink every morning. He's the last guy off the ice. He loves the game."

"People follow him and everybody around him is better. And for our young guys and our culture that was a critical piece for us."

O'Reilly posted 30 points last season (16 goals, 14 assists) in 53 games. In 11 postseason games he scored three goals and added six assists as the Maple Leafs beat Tampa Bay in the first round.

**Schenn for defense**

Schenn signed a three-year deal worth \$8.25 million.

"We have one of the greatest defensemen in the National Hockey League in Roman Josi," Trotz said. "I don't like sometimes when Roman takes some big hits. Luke will make sure those big hits won't be coming too often."

**Nyquist factor as teammate**

Nyquist finished with 27

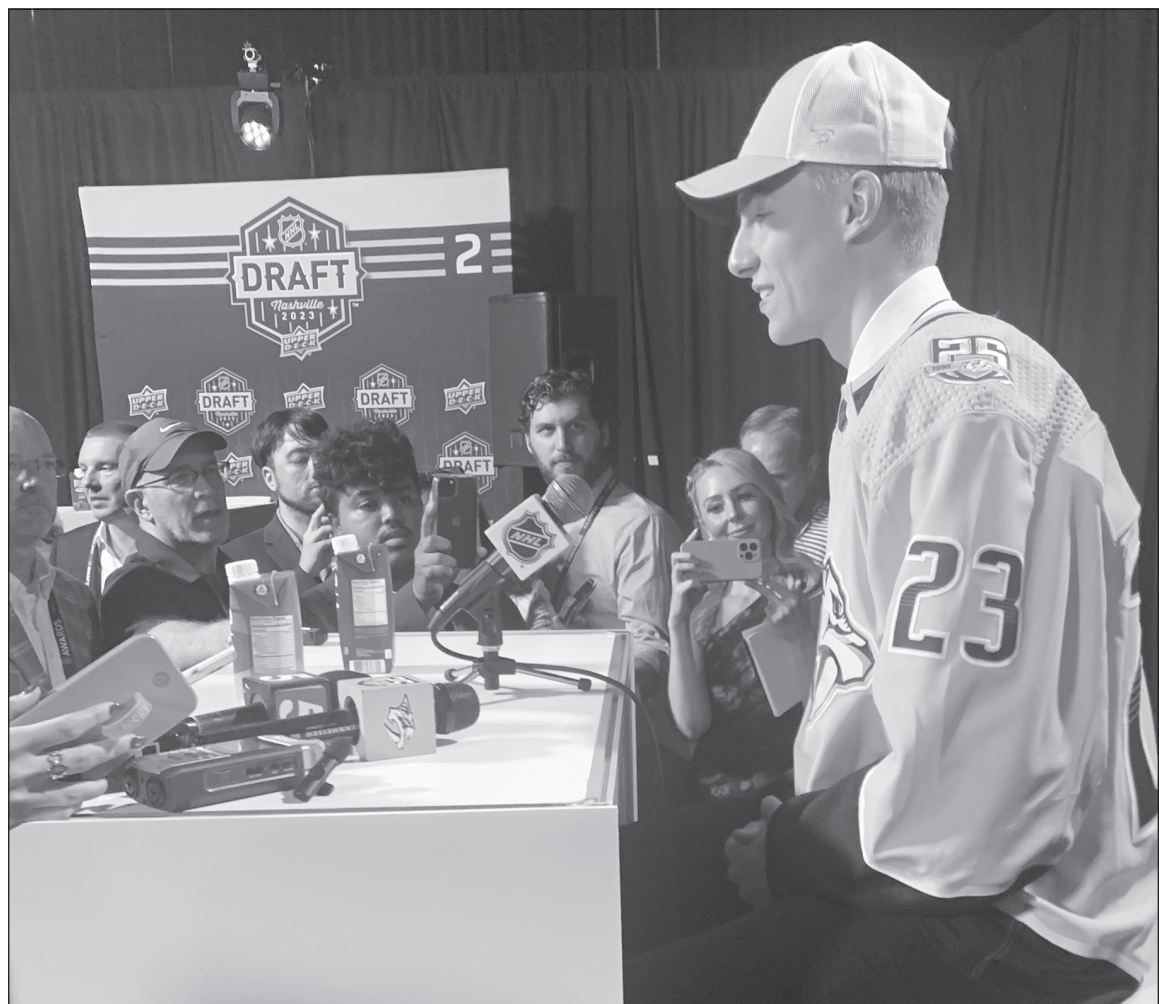

points (11 goals, 16 assists) in 51 games last season. He also added five assists in six playoff games with the Wild. He has signed a two-year contract worth \$6.37 million.

"This guy's a good player and

a really good teammate," Trotz said. "He has had great success."

All these moves are part of Trotz's plan to build a winning culture in Nashville that results in a Stanley Cup win. Trotz, who directed the Washington Capitals

to hockey's ultimate prize, knows what it takes.

The Predators still can make deals. They have cap space left. It should be an interesting rest of the summer in Smashville.

# Reigning PBR champion Nashville Stampede announces 2023 game schedule

NASHVILLE — Ahead of the second season for the ground-breaking PBR (Professional Bull Riders) Teams league, the reigning Champion Nashville Stampede, Music City's first-ever professional bull riding team, has announced their 2023 game schedule.

The 2023 PBR Teams season will include a three-day homestand hosted by each of the eight founding teams, accompanied by two, two-day neutral site events. During event days, each of the league's eight founding teams will compete in one five-on-five bull riding game against another team, with each team competing in 28 games throughout the regular season. The Teams Championship returns to T-Mobile Arena in Las Vegas on October 20-22.

The Nashville Stampede will hold their second-annual homestand, and fourth event of the regular season, Stampede Days on Aug. 18-20 at Bridgestone Arena. During their event, they will play the Missouri Thunder (Aug. 18), Kansas City Outlaws (Aug. 19), and Arizona Ridge Riders (Aug. 20).

During the regular season, the Stampede will compete in a rivalry series with the Arizona Ridge Riders who the team defeated to be crowned the 2023 PBR Teams Championship.

Nashville will take on Arizona on Aug. 20 during the final day of their homestand at Bridgestone Arena; Aug. 27 in Austin, Texas; Sept. 16 in Ridgedale, Missouri; and Sept. 29 in Glendale, Arizona.

Every game during the season will be carried by CBS, including seven "Game of the Week" broadcasts, CBS Sports Network, or Pluto TV. The Nashville Stampede will be featured in one Game of the Week broadcast when their showdown with the Kansas City Outlaws in Nashville airs on CBS on Aug. 20.

In 2022, coached by two-time PBR World Champion Justin McBride, the Stampede proved how patience, timing and staying true to the game plan are key to winning a championship. While the Stampede finished the regular season 7-20-1 to enter the 2022 Teams Championship seeded last of the eight teams, they went 4-and-0 in Las Vegas, beating the top-three seeded teams to win the inaugural Teams Championship.

In Round 1, the Stampede first went toe-to-toe with the No. 3 Oklahoma Freedom, who they stunned 264.75-176 to advance to Round 2. They then faced a David vs. Goliath showdown with the No. 1 Austin Gamblers, riding three more bulls to knock off the Gamblers 265-175.25 to earn the first berth to the Semifinals.

On Championship Sunday, the Stampede squared off against the No. 2 Texas Rattlers. Compliments of an early score from Joao Henrique Lucas, and a 90-point, fifth-frame ride from Kaique Pacheco, the Stampede punched their ticket to the title game with a 178.5-90.25 win.

The Stampede's fate then came down to the Championship Game against the No. 5 Arizona Ridge Riders. Delivering three qualified rides from Ryan Dirteater, Silvano Alves and Pacheco, the Stampede defeated Arizona 264-182.75, completing their shocking run of upsets to be crowned the inaugural PBR Team Series Champions.

In addition to being crowned league Champions, McBride and the Stampede's General Manager Tina Battock were voted Coach and Executive of the Year by their PBR Teams peers.

The surprising twists and turns of the league's inaugural season were captured in the critically acclaimed docuseries, *The Ride*, streaming now on Prime Video.

As the Stampede looks to defend its title of PBR Teams Champions, they will return a talent-packed roster including Pacheco and Alves. During the 2023 individual campaign, Pacheco concluded the regular season ranked No. 1; however, he was unable to contend for his second World Championship after he was sidelined from the PBR's 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary World Finals due to injury.

The remainder of the roster includes: Ednelio Rodrigues Almeida, Dener Barbosa, Kaiden Loud, Thiago Salgado, Mason Taylor, Bruno Carvalho and Matt Triplett.

The Nashville Stampede will host their second annual homestand, Stampede Days, on Aug. 18-20 in Nashville, Tennessee, at Bridgestone Arena. The action begins at 7:45 p.m. CT on Friday, August 18, 6:45 p.m. CT on Saturday, August 19, and 1:45 p.m. CT on Sunday, August 20.

Tickets for the event are on sale now, and start at \$20, taxes and fees not included. They can be purchased online at Ticketmaster.com and PBR.com, at the Bridgestone Arena Box Office, or by calling PBR customer service at 1-800-732-1727.

Three-day ticket packages are available, offering fans a 15% discount on select price levels.

# New Zealander wins Chicago Street Race in NASCAR debut

CHICAGO—When the Grant Park 220 turned topsy-turvy at the 49-lap mark, the change didn't slow New Zealander Shane van Gisbergen, the first driver to win a race in his first NASCAR Cup Series start since Johnny Rutherford accomplished the feat 60 years ago. Driving the No. 91 Chevrolet under the aegis of Trackhouse Racing's Project 91 program, the three-time Supercars champion charged from eighth on a Lap 61 restart to the front of the field and won the series' first-ever street race on the Chicago Street Course in overtime. Asked whether he thought victory was possible in his NASCAR debut, Van Gisbergen chuckled. "No, of course not, but you always dream of it," he said. "Thank you so much to the Trackhouse team and (sponsor) Enhance Health, Project91. What an experience in the crowd out here. This was so cool. This is what you dream of. Hopefully, I can come and do more." What changed the tenor of the race dramatically was NASCAR's decision near the midpoint of the event to shorten the race from the scheduled 100 laps to 75, putting a large group of cars that had pitted on Lap 43 inside their fuel window. After the previously dominant cars of Christopher Bell, Kyle Larson and Tyler Reddick pitted with others for tires and fuel on Lap 47—Van Gisbergen among them—Justin Haley, Austin Dillon and Chase Elliott led the field to green on a single-file restart on Lap 49. At the time Van Gisbergen was 18<sup>th</sup>, but not for long.

"Wow, when we had that back strategy back to 18<sup>th</sup>, I started to worry a bit, but the racing was really good," said Van Gisbergen. "Everyone was respectful. It was tough, but a lot of fun."

The Kiwi passed Haley for the lead

on Lap 71 and beat him to the finish line by 1.259 seconds, after the sliding car of Bubba Wallace knocked Ricky Stenhouse's Chevrolet into the Turn 1 tire barrier to cause the ninth caution on Lap 74 and force overtime.

The decision to shorten the race was a saving grace for Elliott, who had crashed his No. 9 Chevrolet during qualifying and started from the rear of the field in a backup car. Elliott held third after the final restart and finished ahead of Hendrick Motorsports teammate Kyle Larson and Kyle Busch, who were fourth and fifth, respectively.

"Once they changed that race distance, we got pretty fortunate to end up being able to make it on gas," Elliott said. "We kind of inadvertently flipped the strategy."

Haley, who started 36<sup>th</sup> after crashing in practice on Saturday, said he was beaten by a world-class driver on 16-lap better tires.

"Yeah, it was tough," Haley said. "I put it in the tire barrier yesterday and we stayed up all night. I stayed with the guys through the rain and rewrapped this thing, put a new body on it..."

"Obviously congrats to Project91. It sucks, obviously, where we are right now we don't have a... we aren't in position to win every week, so coming that close obviously is not what you want."

"But just really proud of everyone at Kaulig Racing and what an awesome event. Can't wait to come back next year."

Shortening the race wasn't what Bell wanted or needed. He had overtaken Reddick for the lead on Lap 9 and won the first 20-lap stage by a comfortable margin. After a cycle of green-flag pit stops, Bell held an advantage of nearly nine seconds before Noah Gragson's third adventure into the Turn 6 tire barrier caused

the third caution on Lap 29.

By then, drivers had transitioned from wet tires at the start of the event to slicks as the racing line dried out.

Bell survived two subsequent cautions and won Stage 2 under yellow after Alex Bowman stopped on the track at the exit from Turn 5 because of engine issues. By then, Larson had worked his way into the second position and was hounding Bell before the caution.

After the field flipped, Bell finished 18<sup>th</sup>, thanks to a late spin into a tire barrier.

Delayed for nearly 75 minutes by rain, the historic race was eventful from the start. As soon as the green flag waved, Reddick pulled even with pole winner Denny Hamlin. The drivers raced side-by-side until Reddick cleared Hamlin through Turn 5.

Aric Almirola spun near Turn 6 on the opening lap. Erik Jones drove too deep into Turn 6 and collected Brad Keselowski and Gragson. All three drivers extricated themselves from the tire barrier and continued.

On Lap 2, Hamlin slid sideways into the tire barrier on the outside of Turn 2 and lost 11 positions. A lap later, Busch lost control while making a move off the racing line and plowed nose-first into the tire barrier, causing the race's first caution.

After a safety crew pulled Busch's No. 8 Chevrolet from the barrier with a tether, Busch rejoined the field without losing a lap. On Lap 13, Gragson buried the nose of his No. 42 Chevy into the barrier in Turn 6, which proved an early trouble spot on the wet street course.

Hamlin never recovered from his accident and finished 11<sup>th</sup>. Busch, on the other hand, took advantage of his early pit stop to come home fifth.

Austin Cindric, Michael McDowell, Joey Logano, Ty Gibbs and Chris Buescher completed the top 10.

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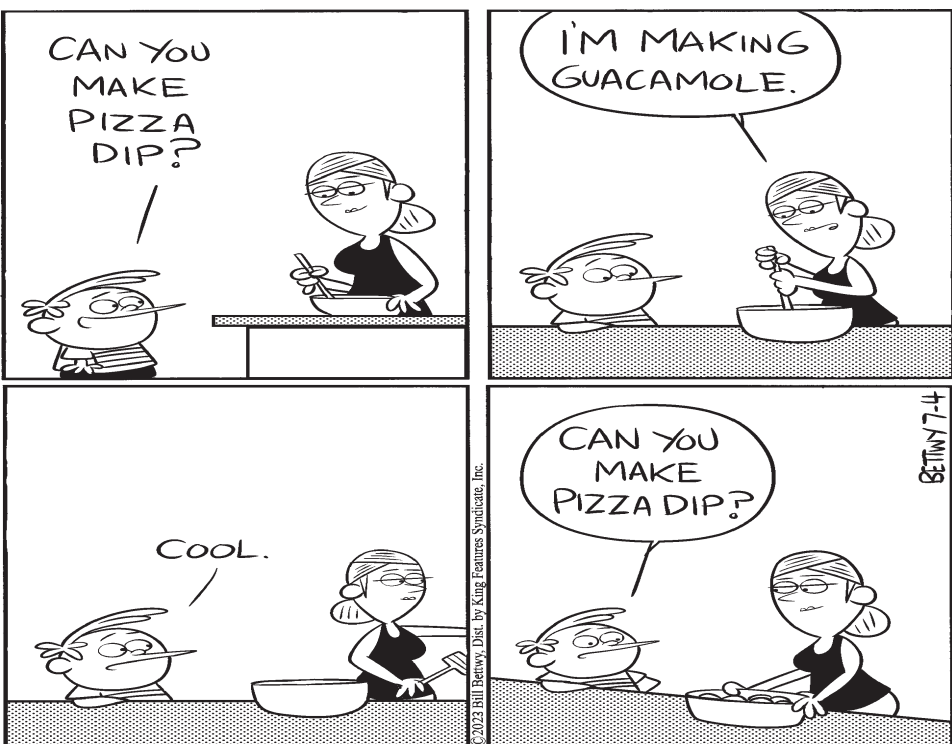
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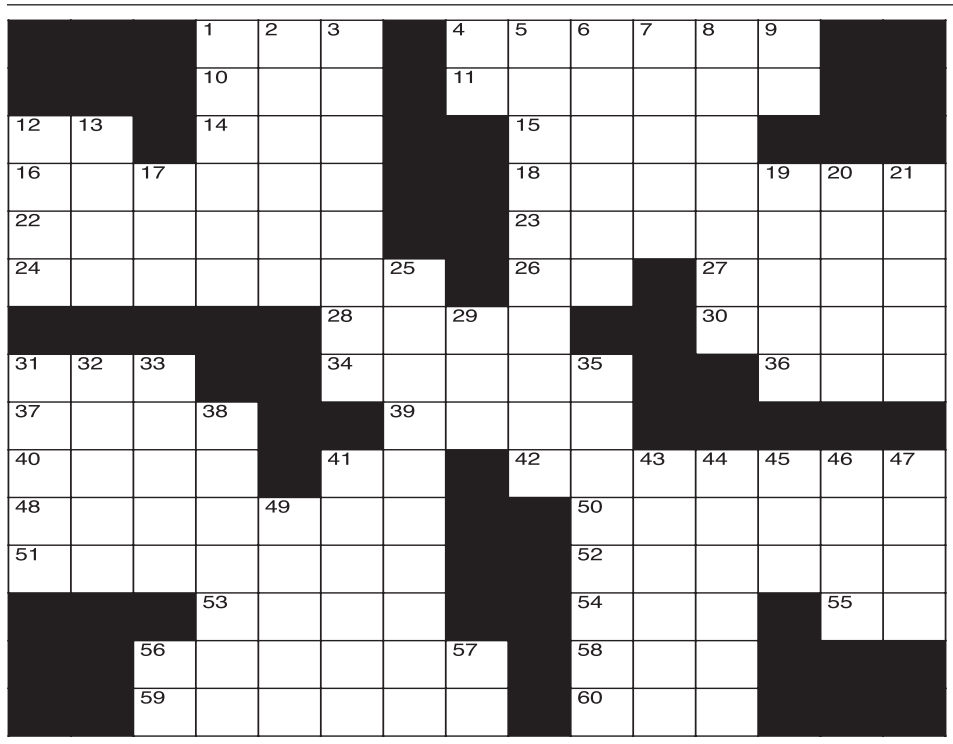

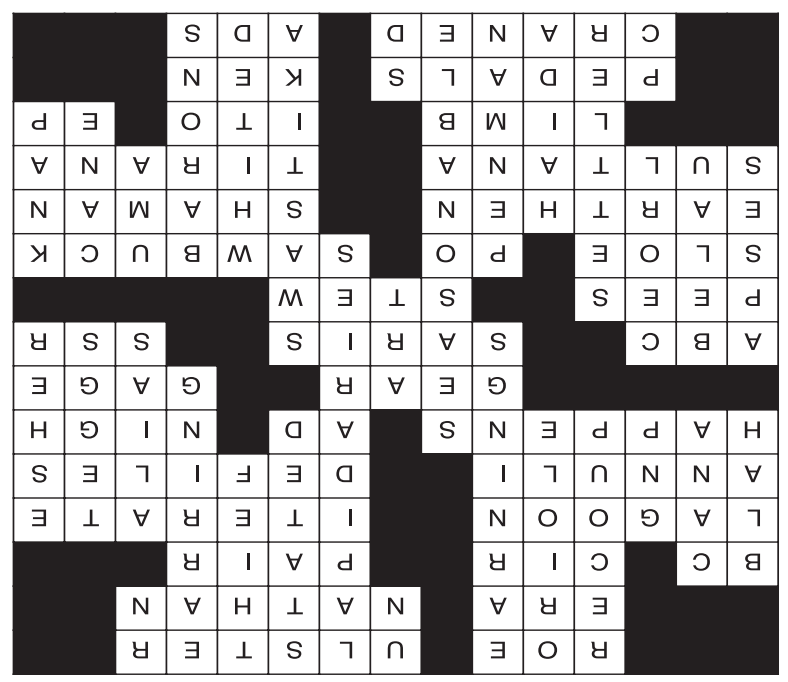

### INDEPENDENCE DAY

This is a special day that so many folks don't really understand. It's not a day for fireworks or picnics or such. It's a day that we ought to rethink about what it really is about.

Let me mention a few things important to me. One of my ancestors came here in the 1700's to avoid religious persecution in Europe. From this family came a Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives and at the same time another member of

Congress from the opposing party. Free to disagree but both worked to make things better.

Also from this same family came a doctor who was opposed to slavery and who went to Indiana in protest when Tennessee seceded from the Union. He came back after the war and served in the Tennessee Legislature and worked with members of the opposing party to restore Tennessee. He was my great-great grandfather.

Another ancestor came here in the 1600's as an indentured servant, a mere teenager who wanted to come here for a new life and willing to work hard for the privilege. He came from the

area of Scotland or Wales. Free after the trip and working for his freedom, he headed a family who moved from Maryland to Virginia, then North Carolina, then Kentucky, and then my branch into Tennessee.

Part of my family came here from Ireland, I'm sure to find a better life when food was hard to be found there. Another part of my family from that same place shared that same desire. And one of them married a Cherokee woman who was hidden by family on a farm in East Tennessee during the Trail of Tears to free and protect her.

And then there is the German family who migrated here with

their daughter before the second World War. The daughter became my great-grandmother who raised a big family, all who contributed to the community where they lived.

Independence to allow freedom and human rights were the common themes for all of these who came here or was born into these families. The right to live and work was accompanied with the responsibilities of working and living right. Defending that independence was never a question, it was a forgone conclusion.

For me, Independence Day on July 4 has a special meaning. For me, it's special every day!

## State veterinarian advises horse owners to protect against disease

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee State Veterinarian is advising horse owners of cases of Equine Herpes Virus One (EHV-1) in a neighboring state.

Last week, two horses at a horse show in Lexington, Virginia tested positive for EHV-1. EHV in all forms is highly infectious and found worldwide. EHV-1 can cause upper respiratory disease, neurological disease, abortions, and neonatal death.

"For the general horse population, there isn't cause for alarm, but I urge owners to be aware of practices that help keep horses healthy," State Veterinarian Dr. Samantha Beaty said. "Consult with your veterinarian to determine appropriate vaccines for your herd. If a horse has been exposed to EHV, such as in the same area in a barn or in a show ring together, I strongly advise quarantining for a minimum of 14 days and up to 30 days in cases of direct contact. This helps prevent the spread of disease and protects others, particularly if you're attending shows or group trail rides."

Equines coming in from other states must have a current certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) to enter Tennessee. This health certificate requires that a veterinarian inspect each equine for signs of disease to ensure that it appears healthy for movement, and it is valid for 30 days. While there is no way to eliminate all risks of disease when comingling horses, vaccinations and good biosecurity measures reduce the risk on the farm and while at competitions. Do not share buckets, brushes, halters, bridles, bits, or other equipment. Contact your veterinarian if you notice any signs of illness in your animals.

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture Animal Health Division is responsible for promoting animal health in Tennessee. The State Veterinarian's office seeks to prevent the spread of disease through import and movement requirements, livestock traceability, disaster mitigation, and the services of the C.E. Kord Animal Health Diagnostic Laboratory. The division collaborates with other health-related stakeholders, academic institutions, and extension services to support One Health, an initiative to improve health for people and animals.
