

He is excited to have his grandma helping him because she has the knowledge of operating a kitchen.

Bryce is excited to use his culinary education. Following his high school graduation in 2014 from North Union High School, he attended Iowa Lakes Community College. He received his AA in 2016. From there, he attended ACI, a 10 month culinary school in Scottsdale, AZ.

The culinary school enhanced his passion for cooking which he now wants to pass on to his customers.

While sitting on the deck with hese new glasses on my face I could see color I had never seen before. The rees were actually green as was the grass. I did get a color quiz with the balloons from my youngest granddaughter who couldn't believe that I had difficulty previously identifying the colors of the balloons, but now could hit most of them on the first try. 


